NEAR-BY NEWS.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

William McKinley will speak at Dunkirk Thursday evening of this week.

Supervisor Crandall of Bolivar is ill and the *Breeze* says his chances for a speedy recovery are not very bright.

E. D. Clark of Fredonia has taken the management of the Hotel Belmont, at Belmont, landlord Potter retires.

Rumor says that Erie train 1 will be made a rapid through train and train No. 11 added to make the stops of train 1.

The teachers' institute for the 2d commissioners' district of Allegany county will be held at Belmont during the week beginning on Oct. 29.

The Hon. Oscar A. Fuller of Wellsville has been engaged by the Republican State Committee to deliver political addresses through the State during the campaign.

The physical culture department of Alfred University has received a gift from Mrs. George H. Babcock of Plainfield, N. J., of \$800 per year for an indefinite period.

It cost \$7,700 to pave Main street, Salamanca, with brick 1,000 feet. 38 feet wide. The work is completed. The people like the improvement so much that they talk of spending more money for the same purpose.

The Indians on the Cattaraugus Reservation have a temperance league with a large membership. The League held its annual convention near Salamanca last week and adopted strong resolutions against the baneful effects of fire water.

The Wellsville lockup caught fire last Friday morning, from a gas jet which had been lighted by a drunken man who had been placed in the building. The flames were under considerable headway when discovered, and the man had a narrow escape from burning to death.

Several schools in the northern commissioners' district are without teachers, owing to the high-grade examinations recently introduced. Commissioner Bluestone has advertised for teachers who have certificates and who are not engaged in teaching to send their names to him at once if they want schools.

James Tomson of Richburg had a narrow escape from bleeding to death Friday. He was in the woods hewing timber, when his ax slipped and struck him in the left leg, making a gash half a foot long. He started to crawl to a house nearby, calling for help all the time. He soon became exhausted and was found a short time after by some persons who were attracted by his voice. He was soaked in blood from head to foot and was nearly dead.

Last week one day Alva Clark, who lives in the town of Castile accidentally shot his wife. Their son had just returned from hunting and handed the gun to his father, who jokingly said, "Suppose I should shoot you?" and pulled the trigger. The contents of the gun struck her in the right shoulder, smashing the shoulder blade and tore away the back of her right hand, which she had raised to defend herself. A surgeon was called and removed seventeen pieces of bone from the shoulder and made her as comfortable as possible. There was no chance for recovery.

The Brundage Well Shot Again.

The Mutual Gas Company's "Brundage well," on the farm of Mrs. Brundage, about three miles from this village, was treated to a large shot of nitroglycerine last Friday. This well was the first one drilled in this vicinity, and has proved to be one of the best. Had this well been located at another point it is possible that we would never have enjoyed the luxury of natural gas, as several wells drilled afterward proved to be very poor gassers, and the fact the Brundage well was a good one doubtless inspired operators to invest more money in developing this field. This well had lately become coated with paraffine to some extent, and the shot last Friday renewed its production very satisfactorily.

Two barns and a large shed, owned by A. L. Wood, who lives in the town of Greenwood, were burned last Saturday morning about 11 o'clock. Mr. Wood was in Andover at the time. The same barns were discovered on fire about two weeks ago. There was an insurance of \$700 on the buildings.
