At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

Article 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Article 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

Article 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 2 cents per line.
