FROM REPUBLICAN ORGANS.

Should Mr. Hill be elected Governor, Isaac H. Maynard is the logical candidate for appointment to the first vacancy that occurs on the bench of the Court of Appeals.—*Rochester Democrat.*

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Bolivar, April 28, 1892, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:
Res. 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.
Res. 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.
Res. 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 10 cents per line.
