NEAR-BY NEWS.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

Allegany county villages are being worked by a cheap printing sharp. He offers 1,000 note heads for \$1.50. The order is taken, 50 cents is paid on the job and the merchants never hear of their note heads.

Rev. Iri R. Hicks, the champion weather guesser, whose prognostications have come nearer right than all the rest of the guessers, says the storm periods of November will be the 5th and 6th, 9th to 14th, 17th and 18th, 21st to 28th. The balance of the month good fair average November weather may be expected.

Charles P. Smith, billing clerk of the American Express company at Dunkirk, was arrested Saturday for appropriating \$133.22 of the company's money and was held for the grand jury with bail fixed at \$2,000.

A very small pig belonging to Jacob Doctor on the Tonawanda Reservation, near Akron, N. Y., was picked up and carried away a few days ago by a large hen-hawk. There was some hard struggling, but the bird succeeded in making its escape before a gun could be procured.

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. John Berg, living a few miles from Jamestown, was stung to death with bees Friday afternoon. The child, 18 months old, crept to a hive and poked up a swarm of bees, which lighted on it, filling its head, hands and feet full of stingers. Before the mother reached the scene the little fellow's system was filled with poison and the hands and face were swollen to a frightful size. Medical aid failed to take effect and the child died in a few hours, writhing in pain.

Sawyer & Co. are getting ready to make a Bradford sand test. They will drill a well on the Sawyer farm, between Allentown and Bolivar, to a depth of 2,500 feet. Work will begin next week. The result of the test will be eagerly watched by every producer in the Allegany field. A good well would mean another boom.—Bolivar Breeze.

Bynard Spaulding of Avoca, Steuben county, was knocked down and robbed in broad daylight a few days ago, by a stranger, who asked for something to eat. Spaulding was carrying wood into the wood shed, when the man made his approach. Spaulding told him that the family was away and that he did not want to go into the house. He stooped down to pick up another armful of wood and that was the last he remembered until his children came home from school and found him lying on his face, and aroused him. His pockets were turned wrong side out and his gold watch was missing. He describes the man as being thick set, with brown hair and whiskers. The watch was found about three rods from where Spaulding was lying.

Work has ceased for an indefinite period in several departments of the Wellsville tannery, and 100 men are thrown out of work.

Resolutions by the Teachers' Institute.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Teachers' Institute of Allegany County, held at Belmont last week.

Inasmuch as the Department of Public Instruction has continually worked toward an advancement in the standard of qualification of teachers in the common schools of the state; and inasmuch as we are satisfied that the present system of requiring all papers to be sent to Albany for examination is a direct step toward this end, therefore,

Resolved, That we commend the action of the State Department as tending to improve the schools and advance the position and salary of the teacher, as shown by the results already attained.
