The News office is located in the Prest Block on Main street. Entrance through the hallway, first door north of Lever's hardware store.

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Hollister, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892: RULE 1--That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived. RULE 2--Cards of thanks to be charged \$1. RULE 3--Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.
