Tuesday, October 23, Mrs. Mary A. Woodbridge was at her desk, or, intent upon her many arduous duties, was fitting in and out of the publishing office, in the best of health and the fullest of spirits. She left at five o'clock. In the evening she accompanied her secretary to a church near her residence, and returning, to her home chatted merrily with Mrs. Bigelow, her hostess, till ten o'clock, when she retired. The next morning she did not come to the office, but no surprise was felt. Some proof requiring her personal attention was sent to her in the afternoon, and upon the return of the messenger the sorrowful news of her illness was learned. Consultation of eminent physicians had already declared restoration to health or consciousness impossible, as paralysis had attacked the brain. At thirteen minutes past six on Thursday evening, Oct. 25, the beautiful spirit took its flight so peacefully and sweetly that it was difficult to tell when the end came.

She held the threefold position of responsibility, honor and most laborious toil as secretary of the World's and National unions and of the Woman's Temperance Publishing Association.

One says, "She, being dead, yet speaketh." In the light of her white life and white death, with what prophetic power sounds in our ears again the last public words we heard her utter, at Miss Willard's reception, September 28:

"We cannot stop. God bids us on: we must and will obey. God bless you now! God bless you ever! Hold fast to the Infinite, the positive pole of holiness and power. Another palm shall strike your own, and on and on—until the negative pole of the world's weakness and sin shall be reached. Then will the divine current flow, and not only will His children be quickened, but the iniquity against which we inveigh shall be shivered and shattered to atoms. Then will voice turned in the harmonies of heaven we will sing glory and honor and praise and thanksgiving to Him who has redeemed us forever and forever."

Dr. John Henry Barrows, in his stirring appeal for a union of all forces against intemperance, at the celebration of Father Mathew's birthday in Chicago, October 10, said: "Moral suasion is good but it ought to be accompanied by a legal sanction. Father Mathew's statue today in Cork is surrounded by drink shops, and this indicates that the strong arm of the law must enforce the right of the state and of the home to self-protection."

By-Laws of the Andover State Bank.

Regulating the election of its directors and officers. (Published in compliance with Sec. 11, Chap. 687 of the 1892 Laws of New York.)

Art. I, Sec. 1. The Annual meeting of Stock-holders shall be held on the third Wednesday of December in each year at the office of the Association: at 8 o'clock, p. m.

Art. I, Sec. 3. The President may in his discretion, adjourn without action any Annual or Special Meeting of Stock-holders, at which there shall not be represented, either in person or by written proxy, at least fifty per cent. of the Capital Stock of the Association.

Art. I, Sec. 6. The following Order of Business shall be observed at all meetings of the Stock-holders or of the Board of Directors, so far as consistent with the purposes of the meetings so to do:

STOCK HOLDERS' MEETINGS.
Reading of Journal and action there on; Report of Officers; Report of Committees; Election of Directors; Election of Committees; Unfinished Business; New Business.

Art. II, Sec. 1. The right of any Stock-holder to vote at any meeting of the Stock-holders shall be governed and determined by Sections 20 and 21 of Chapter 687 of the Laws of 1892, of New York.

Art. III, Sec. 1. There shall be a Board of Directors, consisting of six (6) Stock-holders, who shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting of Stock-holders, and who shall hold their respective offices for one year from the first day of April next ensuing, or until their successors are elected and qualified. A majority of all votes cast shall be necessary for the election of Directors.

Art. III, Sec. 2. At any time not exceeding ten (10) days preceding the next ensuing election of Directors the President shall appoint two (2) Inspectors of Election who shall serve at the next ensuing election of Directors or until their successors are appointed and qualified, who shall discharge the duties required of them by statute.

Art. III, Sec. 3. A Bond-approving Committee of three (3) Stock-holders, and an Auditing Committee of three (3) Stockholders, all preferably not Directors of the Association, shall be elected by the Stock-holders, in any manner they may adopt, at the time of the election of Directors, members of which committees shall hold their respective offices for one year from April 1st, next ensuing, or until their successors are elected.

Art. III, Sec. 4. The Board of Directors shall elect from their members, at their quarterly meeting in December, a President, Vice President, Cashier and Secretary, PROVIDED, that the Cashier may also hold the office of Secretary, who shall hold their respective offices for one year from April 1st, next ensuing, or until their successors are elected and qualified. * * * In addition to the offices by this section provided, the Board of Directors may from time to time create such additional ones as in its judgment shall promote the best interests of the Association.
