The Board convened at 3 o'clock p.m. E. J. Norton of Scio was elected Chairman of the Board by acclamation, and Chas. Stillman was chosen Clerk in the same manner. C. E. Ingham of Hume was appointed assistant Clerk.

After the organization was completed the Board adjourned until Tuesday morning.

## Died While Intoxicated.

Thomas McDermott of Belmont was found dead at his home in that place last Sunday morning. The story, as it comes to us from a reliable source is as follows: McDermott became very much intoxicated Saturday night, and started home at a late hour, accompanied by a person whose name we did not learn. When they were about half way to McDermott's house, the latter was unable to proceed further, and sank to the ground, entirely helpless. The person who accompanied him procured a wheelbarrow and wheeled him home. He lay upon the floor all night, and in the morning when his wife arose she was unable to arouse her husband. She sent for a physician, who stated that the man had been dead several hours. He leaves a wife and one small child.

## To Experiment With an Electrocutted Man.

Ever since the adoption of the electrical execution act by the State the Westinghouse company, whose dynamos are used, have declared that electricity was not the cause of death, but that death was assured by the holding of an autopsy directly after the body had been taken from the electrical chair. No less an authority than Nicola Tesla, the famous electrician, contended that he could bring back to life a man killed in an electrical chair, provided the attempt was made immediately after execution. George Westinghouse always has asserted that the electrical death was a sham, and the New York Commission headed by Elbridge T. Gerry had added the autopsy clause to the law so as to make it certain that the man was dead. Within the last two weeks the agitation of the subject has again become prominent, and an appeal is to be made to the Governor to allow the next man condemned to death at Auburn to be experimented upon. Governor Flower has stated that he is willing to allow experts to make the tests, and it is probable that the experiment will be tried.
