It begins to appear as if the Republican party was the People's party.

Since election there has been a great deal said in the papers about the need for a blanket ballot to take the place of the numerous official ballot now in use, and it is quite probable that the incoming Legislature will pass a law making the change.

When George Myers, a Democrat in Willow Run, Kentucky, heard of Hill's defeat in New York he was so discouraged that he went to his barn and tried to commit suicide. We don't believe Elyon Reynolds of Belmont will make as big a fool of himself as that.

A curious state of affairs exists in the ninth Assembly district of New York, where the returns show that there is a tie vote for Baxter, the Republican, and McDermott, the Tammany candidate, the vote for each being 5,031. Thus again are exemplified the weight and the worth of the individual ballot.

It is a singular fact, but true nevertheless, that a very large proportion of the voters of this state had very little knowledge concerning the Constitutional Amendments prior to election. Since it has been ascertained that the Amendments were all carried, these people are learning what an excellent Constitution we are going to have.

The state at the end of coming fiscal years will be unable to give to the county fair associations very much cash under the terms of the Ives pool law. Under that law racing associations were taxed 5 per cent. upon net receipts, which was, at the end of the year, distributed among the associations to improve the breed of live stock. Last year nearly \$23,000 were distributed among the county fair associations under this law. As betting is absolutely prohibited by the new constitution, pool selling at the races will be impossible.

The adoption of the amendments to the constitution proposed by the Constitutional Convention is assured. These amendments have been thoroughly discussed in their general bearing, but their application to the present situation has not been considered in detail. They will make a number of changes in the tenure of office of state and local officers and in elections in the future. Governor Morton's term will be two years only, under the following clause of the revised constitution: "The governor and lieutenant governor elected next preceding the time when this section shall take effect, shall hold office until and including the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and their successors shall be chosen at the general election in that year."

Governor Flower has issued a short, concise and eloquent Thanksgiving proclamation. It is a model of its kind. It contains, however, some sentences which, whether intentionally or not, have a peculiar application to the present situation. When the governor calls upon the people to return thanks for the establishment of "conditions for a return of industrial and commercial prosperity," he doubtless refers to the Republican victory which will put a speedy end to tariff tinkering. But, while calling upon the people to celebrate the Republican victory, the governor has a word of hope for the Democrats. "Let that day also," he says, "be marked by the generous expression of sympathy with the poor, the afflicted and the unfortunate. The ways of God are often inscrutable and those whom He loveth He sometimes chasteneth."

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishing Association, held at Hollivar, April 30, 1894, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1895:
Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.
Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.
Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.
