**The Greater New York.**

The Legislature last winter authorized the cities of New York and Brooklyn, and contiguous territory, to vote on the question of consolidation into one great municipality.

The vote was intended simply as a feeler of public opinion. Action toward consolidation remains wholly with the Legislature.

Consolidation was approved at the polls. New York city voted aye by 20,000 majority and Brooklyn the same way by 1,400. Richmond county and Long Island City also gave considerable affirmative majorities.

The plan for the greater New York proposes the consolidation of New York city, Brooklyn, Flatbush, Flatlands, Gravesend, New Utrecht, Richmond county, West Chester, part of the towns of East Chester and Pelham, Flushing, part of Hempstead, Jamaica Bay. The total area of the greater New York will be 317.88 square miles and population 3,000,000.

It will make New York the second city in the world in size, ranking next to London which has a population of 4,231,431, and outranking Paris, now the second city by half a million. New York city will then contain half the population of New York state, and a greater population than any other state of the Union except Ohio, Illinois and Pennsylvania.

**Support Your Home Paper.**

There is hardly any way in which a person can do so much for his own locality, with so little cost and at the same time with so much benefit to himself and his family, as by giving a hearty support to his local paper. At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishing Association, held at Bolivar, April 23, 1894, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 8, 1894:

Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.
