### The Coming Centennial Celebration of Allegany County.

In accordance with the instructions of the meeting of the Allegany County Historical Society, held at Belmont, October 16th, 1894, President J. S. Minard has appointed the following committee to name the time and place for the celebration of the Centennial of Allegany County's settlement, which will occur in 1895, viz.: Hon. Hamilton Ward, Hon. S. M. Norton, Hon. C. A. Farnum, Hon. D. P. Richardson and E. D. Loveridge.

A committee consisting of one member from each town has been appointed to solicit members in their respective localities for the Historical Society. T. N. Boyd is the member for Andover, and Theodore Cobb for Independence.

It is hoped that each one of this committee will bestir himself and secure a goodly number of names with the one dollar admission fee; the gentlemen so obtained and appearing will be regarded as charter members of the Society. There ought to be a membership of 500 before next spring. Names and money can be handed to W. J. Richardson, treasurer, Belmont, prior to or at the next meeting, second Wednesday in January next.

### Highway Robbery at Cuba.

C. A. DeKay of Cuba, who runs a confectionery and news store, was robbed by two men, last evening, while on his way from the store to his home. Mr. DeKay had in his hands a box containing nearly \$200. When he was nearly home he was met by two men who stopped him and demanded the box, which was not given up, however, until one of the men clapped his hand over Mr. DeKay's mouth and the other placed a revolver at his head, when he decided that personal safety was at stake and released his hold. The robbers having secured the booty made a hasty escape, and although efforts are being made to capture them, no trace has yet been found.

Mr. DeKay is an elderly gentleman, and the loss will prove a serious one for him. The Cuba public telephone station is in his store, and upwards of \$25 of the amount stolen was telephone money.

### The Way It Works in Cuba.

Among the cases brought before Judge Norton last week, that of the People vs. McDowell was peculiar. McDowell, a notorious liquor seller who has since found it convenient to leave Cuba, was arrested for selling liquor without license at Cuba in the fall of 1893, on the sworn affidavit of a man by the name of Wildrich. Geo. H. Eldridge was the president of the citizens' league that was behind the prosecution. The case was tried before a jury and the jury not only cleared McDowell, but they recommended that Mr. Eldridge should pay about \$19 costs that had been made in the case. Mr. Eldridge may deem himself fortunate in getting off without imprisonment and having his property dynamited a-la-Andover.—Friendship Register.
