Work For Young Men.

The State Committee of Young Men's Christian Association has organized a new form of work for towns of 2,000 population and under, known as a "Section" of the Young Men's Christian Association. These Associations are now established at 150 points in New York state in the larger towns and cities, with eleven "Sections" in the smaller towns.

The need for some place in even small towns where young men can meet during Winter evenings under wholesome Christian influences is recognized by citizens generally. In the majority of cases a single church could not maintain this work; therefore an interdenominational effort such as these Associations provide commands the sympathy of all who have the interests of young manhood at heart.

The formation of a "Section" of this work in a place unites that place with the towns and cities all over the country and world where these organizations exist. By this means, young men going from a small place to any city, would be introduced at once to the helpful relations of Church and Association, rather than permitting them to form associates whose influence might lead downward, as is too often the case.

It also enables the work to be undertaken in a simple form, uniting the aggressive Christian element among young men in a town in specific work for their fellows.

The management is vested in an Executive Committee of from three to nine young men, appointed annually by the State Committee. This Board forms the "Section," secures members and controls the work. Committees are appointed from the members upon such phases of work as are desired. The chief features are a Young Men's Meeting or Bible Study, and possibly an evening reading room for the Winter months. A Good Plan.

It turns out that the potato plan of the mayor of Detroit was a great success. The crop has been harvested, the reports are all in and the profits counted. It will be remembered that last spring, when the problem of the unemployed was so serious, and common humanity demanded some sort of immediate solution of it. Detroit's mayor hit upon the plan of putting the city's unemployed to work the vacant lots. There were hundreds of unimproved pieces of property, speculatively held, which the owners were perfectly willing to have others improve without cost to them. Tools and seed were purchased, and scores of men were set to work by the city tilling the soil and raising the potatoes. The crop which has been harvested, amounted to 40,000 bushels, against which the city's expenditure were only \$2,100, while, better than the crop, is the employment that it gave to idle men. This is worth remembering.
