DEATHS.

Mrs. Hannah Clark died of paralysis, at her residence in this village, Dec. 23d, 1895. Mrs. Clark was a sister of Thomas and the late Matthew White, of this town. She was 69 years of age. She was born in County Sligo, Ireland, and came to America when but 17 years old. She became the wife of Michael Clark, and the loving companionship extended through nearly fifty years more than forty of which were passed in Alfred and Andover. In both towns the many excellent qualities of her head and heart gained for her many friends. Her wifely and motherly qualities were such as to make her home a happy one and her memory blessed. Besides her husband, nine children mourn her death. They are: M. L. Clark, of Friendship; Mrs. W. M. Fay, of Jamestown; Matthew, who lives somewhere in the West; Mrs. L. P. Scribner, of Los Angeles, Cal.; Misses Mary and Hannah Clark, of this village; Mrs. J. Coon, of Mina, Pa., and John H. and Thomas Clark, of Andover. The funeral services were held on Thursday at the Church of the Blessed Sacrament, and were largely attended.

William Dean, son of P. A. Dean of this town, died on Saturday, Dec. 21st, of appendicitis. His age was 16 years. The young man was ill only a few days, and his death was a sad blow to his parents and friends. The funeral was held Monday following death, and was very largely attended.

Mrs. Julia Briggs of Hallsport died at the home of Uriah Davis in this town, Dec. 15th, of paralysis. The deceased was in Andover on a visit to relatives, when she received the stroke. The remains were taken to Hallsport for burial. Mrs. Briggs was 67 years of age.

James Green died in Bradford, Pa., Monday, Dec. 30th, 1895. He formerly lived in this vicinity and was the son of Garrett Green. His age was about 25 years. The remains were brought here for interment today (Wednesday).

School for Indian Children.

The question has been agitated for several years by the Presbyterians of Western New York of founding an industrial school for the Indians of this region. There are 1,467 children of school age among them. Most of them are growing up with little or no education of any kind. Forty per cent. of the whole number were not reached at all by the public schools last year. The fourth only of the whole number at any school for the year, and this fourth was composed largely of different pupils from week to week.

After mature deliberation, extending over two years, the Presbyterian Synod of New York voted unanimously, in October, 1894, to establish an industrial school for Indians in Western New York, if the necessary means could be provided, and requested every church in the Synod to make one offering yearly for the school until it became self-supporting. At present this is the situation regarding this endeavor: A site, free of cost, consisting of 100 acres of land at Portville, Cattaraugus county, near the largest Indian reservation, is already pledged. A bequest of \$10,000 from the estate of Gov. Olden was promised by his executor, Dr. J. P. Egbert of St. Paul, on condition that an equal amount be raised by October 16, 1895, and that the school be guaranteed to continue at least 10 years.

Of the \$10,000 required to be raised in order to receive the bequest of like amount, there is still lacking about \$4,000, but it is expected this will soon be realized and that steps will be taken to bring the project so a successful accomplishment.
