Miss Emma C. Sickles, who achieved considerable reputation for the couragous part she played in the Indian unrising at Pine Ridge Agency in 1990, has received a gold medal from a so-clety in France, whose motto is "To save or to perish". Miss Sickles was a teacher in the Indian school at Pine Ridge Agency, and was well acquaint ed with all the Indians. When the uprising occurred in 1890 she volun-teered her services as a mediator to the War Department Secretary Proctor and General Schofield sanctioned her enterprise. She managed at great personal risk to get into the camp great personal risk to get into the camp of the hostile Indians, and although massacre of Wounded Knee took place, she has always maintained that by giving General Miles timely information of the intentions subsequent to that she averted a wholesale slaughter at the agency.

A Montana man who has just visited Cripple Creek says: "There are nearly 20,000 people there and it is difficult to get hotel accommodations. men and people from all parts of the country are flocking there in great numbers It's 'Cripple Creck, Cripple Creek,' from one end of the State to the other. The people of Denver can talk of nothing else but Cripple Creek, and even in Omaha and the cities fur-ther east, the district is attracting genuine attention. The markets are flooded with Cripple Creek stocks. Like any other district, some of the properties are good, but most of them have really no claims. Statistics of the production and workings of the great Anaconda mines in Montana, not hitherto ascertainable, have been made public through the sale of nearly half the capital stock to Englishmen, and are given in the Engineering and Mining Journal. These copper mines are the largest in the world, the Rio Tinto in Spain ranking next and those of the Calumet and Hecla, on Lake Superior, the The Anaconda mines have been 1,200 feet and have more than 3,000.000 tons of copper ore in sight. The month. Besides the mines the plant includes a hotel, town properties, a railroad, sawmils, coke and electric plants; machine shops and the like; in all about \$15.500,000 in cash has been expended upon the property. Be-sides the copper, the Anacouda Com-pany is the second largest producer in the world, ranking next to the Brokeu Hill mines, that metal being contained in the pig copper; the silver product of 1895 amounted to 5.500,000 ounces fine, with 22,000 ounces of gold. The profit on copper for the last six months has averaged 4 cents per pound. The output per year is estimated at 50.000 tons; at present prices for copper it is expected that in 1896 \$3,000,000 will be paid in dividends of 2½ per cent. on the 1,200,000 shares, leaving about \$1,000,000 of profits reserved for working capital. The report of the experts closes with these words: "The attractive features of the Anaconda are that it can now produce much more copper than any other company and at a smaller cost per ton." due to the silver and gold now recovered by improved processes. Altogether no one has be-fore been able to learn what a really great mining property the Anaconda is.

Interesting Discoveries in Arizona's

untain Regions Probably there are very few, if any, towns in Arizona that can boast of the interesting surroundings of Eaglestaff. Within a radius of ten miles are to be found the famous cliff dwellings, the beautiful San Francisco peaks, the ancient cave dwellings, and the well-known bottomiess pits. Here the every whim of the geologist and philologist can be satisfied. The former has for his investigation the San Francisco peaks, which are over 13,000 feet high, and which are said to contain every geological stratum known.

The cave dwellings, reached by a ten mile drive through a beautiful country, are full of interest. Reaching the mountain and beginning its as-cent, we find broken pieces of pottery strewn in every direction, and walking further up until we reach within 500 or 600 feet of the top, we first begin to encounter the caves, which average from twenty to forty feet in circum-

Descending into these about fifteen feet, we find ourselves in the midst of a circular chamber, with openings leading from each side into other chambers equal or smaller sizes. By kicking up the ground in the cave a person will frequently find choice pieces of pottery. Around the outer edge of the caves there are walls, evidently placed as a fortification. The general character of all the caves is the same.

Continuing the ascent to the top of the mountain, you will find a large, square plateau, which is fenced off by a rude stone wall, and here are found large stones, which were evidently used by the dwellers for the grinding of their corn, etc. They bear great sim-ilarity to those used by the Indians and Mexicans of to-day.

Coming down from the ancient mountain and following the road several miles to the southeast, the tourist comes to the cliff dwellers' abode. Here, in a large canyon, from 1400 to 1600 feet deep deep and several miles long are found the last dwelling places of these mysterious people. -approach the brink of the canyon, tier after tier of these dwellings rise be-fore you, some hewn into the solid sides of the canyon, with a door opening of

about four feet square.

Following the trail down the canyon about half a mile, we come to a different class of dwellings from these, Here, under large, overhanging cliffs, the ancient builders have constructed rude walls of masonry from the floor to the top of the cliffs, thus making an apartment with the cliff for the roof.
In these are found remnants of old fire ovens, and now and then a piece of pottery or stone work, which would person to believe that they were in some way connected with the cave dwellers, as the relics found in both places are almost identically the same

The question yet to be solved is whether these dwellings in the cliffs and in the caves were permanent homes or merely places of refuge in time of danger. The latter theory aptime of danger. The latter theory pears to be the most plausible in case of the cave dwellers, as their places of dwelling are all very difficult of access and are fortified by stone walls, and from the further fact that the surrounding plains are thickly covered with broken pottery, which would indicate the presence of a resident pop-

#### Sources of Ivery.

African ivory is now conceded to be the finest. The first quality of this comes from near the equator, and it has been remarked with regard to this facthat the nearer the equator the smaller is the elephant, but the larger the tusks. The ivory from equatorial Africa is closer in the grain, and has less tendency to become yellow exposure than Indian ivory. The fin est transparent African ivory is lected along the west coast bety latitudes 10 degrees north and 10 de grees south, and this is believed to de-teriorate in quality and to be more liable to damage with increase of latitude in either direction. The whites ivory comes from the east coast. It is roory comes from the east coast. It is considered to be in best condition when recently cut; it has then a mellow, warm, transparent tint, as if soaked in oil, and very little appearance of

Indian ivory has an opaque, dead white color, and a tendency to become discolored. Of the Asian varieties Siam is considered to be the finest, being a device which she believes will arrest the enemies of physical beauty.

in Apulia was the destruction of the Decisi and the execution of their chief, the Abate Ciro Annichiarico. The rank and file of this society consisted wholly of murderers, none being admitted to membership unless he could prove that he had killed at least two persons in cold blood. Ciro, its chief and founder, was a renegade priest, the list of whose personal homicides is horrible and tedious. But his power was so great that no peasant or noble dared betray his secret. The people too, believed him to be a stregone; and it was said that his death was only ef-fected by a sliver bullet from his own carbine, which, "of course," broke the

spell of his enchantments.

So confident and fearless in them, selves were the Decisi that the chiefs wore a sliver death's head round his neck, and openly carried a dagger with inscriptions identifying the owners as members of the band. They had several rites and ceremonies, and hanners and trumpets; and the other societies, such as the Filadelfi and the Republica Salentina, were affiliated to them. The greatest blow struck at the Derisi was the direct result of this affili-ation. At a campo of the Filadelf. ation. At a campo of the Filadelf, presided over by a rich lawyer of Lecce, a decree of death to Generale Giorgio (as they franslated Church's name) was formally pronounced. It was sent on to the Decisi for execution. which called a meeting to comply with the amiable request. But "Giorgio" had got wind of the meeting, and the terror was trapped in the nick of time.
