ANOTHER GUSHER.

The Mutual Company's Oil Well on J. J. Warfield's Farm is Just That.

The Mutual Company have finished their well on J. J. Warfield's farm. It was shot on Monday of this week and will be as good a well as there is in the field. Just how much oil it will produce cannot be told at present, as it has not been pumped steadily since being shot, the workmen having been bothered by a series of slight mishaps, but the man who places its daily production at from eight to twelve barrels need have no pangs of conscience on account of possible exaggeration.

Alfred University.

Apparently Alfred University is now entering upon a new era of success, and that institution will doubtless within the next few years take a place among the Universities of the country which no similar college anywhere in this section has ever occupied. In days gone by Alfred University has been the one place where students from Allegany and adjoining counties could pursue many studies which are now taught in academies scattered throughout this section, and many former students at that school who afterward became widely known in professional fields can truthfully say that had it not been for the advantages offered at Alfred they would have been unable to obtain the education which proved the basis of their success.

Time and the progressive spirit have wrought many changes in the character of schools, as in other matters, and as the course of study in graded schools and academies has been gradually broadened, such is the case also at Alfred. As the University was formerly prepared to take students who had passed beyond the narrow limits of district schools, so now is it prepared to take those who graduate from the Regents' studies and give them the advantages of college education. Alfred University does not seek to compete with village schools, but asks those students who contemplate entering a university or college to examine the facilities offered there for a higher education, confident that after so doing the advisability of entering that institution will be apparent.

Students living in Allegany and adjoining counties may pursue the same studies that are taught at similar institutions located at great distances from their homes, and the saving in expenses may be the means of giving large numbers of young people the education they could not otherwise obtain.
