The special committee on good roads, authorized by the Assembly of 1895, has made its report. It contains some recommendations that will be carefully considered by all who are in favor of an improved system of highways, and it must be conceded that the number of people who favor better roads, is very large. It seems to be probable that the Legislature will take some action on the subject this winter. The question of better roads is one of the problems of the present day, and some movement that will make the highways of the state better and easier to travel will be a popular one. The present manner of working roads under the town commissioners of highways and pathmasters is a waste of time and money, though little of the latter is now expended. Stone is the only proper material to use on country roads. Dirt and gravel will not stand the wear and tear consequent to travel. The hauling of dirt from the side ditches to the middle of the highways goes on year after year, without any permanent benefit. No one should object to improved highways, though doubtless there will be differences of opinion as to details of a new system of working or improving the roads. Some plan should be adopted, and it is hoped that the Legislature will adopt some scheme of road improvement that will be popular.

RULE 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.
RULE 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.
RULE 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for a not less than 5 cents per line.
