Noticing the revolver sticking out from under the pillow, he picked it up and began to play with it. In some accidental manner the revolver was discharged, the bullet taking effect in John Holmes' head, killing him instantly as he lay asleep in bed. At first it was thought to be a case of suicide, but, by questioning the little brother, the truth was finally learned. The Holmes family is one of the most highly respected in East Troupsburg, and John was an excellent young man.
