All who "desire the physical, intellectual and moral improvement of mankind" are invited to attend Mies Anthony, president, and Mrs. Rachael Foster Avery, corresponding secretary, who sign the call, point with pride to the fact that in this convention, for the first time in the history of the Association, every State and Territory except Alaska will be represented. They refer to the im mense gains made in this and other countries since the last convention -"Utah completing a trinity of true re publics at the summit of the Rock es; the full enfranchisement of South Australian women:" and "hail with joy the magnificent growth of public sentiment resulting in the submission of a woman suffrage amendment to the constitutions of five States by their respective legislatures; the twenty-six votes for woman's full en franchisement in the recent constitutional convention of South Carolina; and the result of the vote on the sham referendum in Massachusetts, showing that one out of every three men and nineteen out of every twenty women of that conservative commonrealth who expressed at the ballot box their opinions on this question. were in favor of equal suffragestartling revelation to remonstrants throughout the entire nation."

Ups and Down of the Oil Business.

At the beginning of oil operations in the town of Alma, this county, William Spargur and others of Wellsville entered upon lands belonging to Mrs. Electa A. Dyke of Pikeville, and began drilling for oil. Mrs. Dyke forbade such work; but Spargur claimed that he could hold the land under some kind of a contract made years before Mrs. Dyke secured her title. Mrs. Dyke sued Spargur for possession and the Supreme Court in January, 1887, decided that she was en titled to possession. Spargur appealed to the Court of Appeals, which court decided in 1893 that Mrs. Dyke had per

During all these years the National Transit Company, a branch of the Standard Oil Company, was running the oil from the property as requested by Mr. Spargur. Mrs. Dyke, early in the controversy, served a notice upon the National Transit Company notify ing it of her claims, which were entirely Upon the decision of the Appeals that she was the owner of the land, Mrs. Dyke brough an action against the National Transit Company to recover from that company the value of the oil taken by it agains The company defended upon the ground that the expense of drilling the wells should be deducted from the value of the oil before any avails should be delivered to Mrs Dyke The case was tried last June before Judge Spring, who has just rendered his decision, wherein he awards judg ment in Mrs. Dyke's favor against the Transit Company for \$25,361,20. case will probably be appeated.
