## DEATHS.

Miss Maud Perkins, daughter of Mrs. Melissa Perkins of Voorhies Hill in this town, died Tuesday morning, Jan. 28. The funeral will be held tomorrow (Thursday) at 1 o'clock, at the house. Burial will take place at Independence. Miss Perkins was a sister of N. Perkins of this village.

Edward Brewster died at his home in Greenwood on Tuesday, Jan. 28th, aged 78 years and 10 months. The funeral will be held on Friday at two o'clock at the house. Mr. Brewster leaves a widow and three children: Anson and Philetus Brewster of Greenwood; Mrs. Emma Whitcomb of Scio.

Lewis Green died at his home in this village Sunday morning, Jan. 26, 1896, at about 1 o'clock. His age was 87 years and 10 months. Mr. Green had been in feeble health for a long time, and for many months had been gradually failing. The funeral, which was largely attended, was held at the house yesterday afternoon, Rev. W. B. Wagner officiating, assisted by Rev. W. Brewster. Mr. Green was born in Chango county. When he was 23 years old he moved to Alfred, this county, where he married Lucretia Howe, who died nearly twelve years ago. He had lived in Andover 48 years and was well known and highly respected here. Mr. and Mrs. Green were the parents of five children. The only son, LeRoy, died in the army. The others are Miss Sarah Green and Mrs. John Davis of this place; Mrs. Adelia Barker of Hornellsville; Mrs. Helen June of Nunda.
