NEAR-BY NEWS.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

By a vote of 53 to 7 the village of Portville has decided to bond itself for water works.

Last Monday the Erie put on two additional local trains between Hornellsville and Attica.

President Davis, of the Alfred University, secured an endowment of \$10,000 for the Chair of Chemistry. This will be good news to the many friends of the University.

Tom. W. Winder, the celebrated long distance bicycle rider, who rode a wheel around the border of the United States, a distance of 21,600 miles, will remove from Wersaw, Ind. to Elmira.

The annual convention of the Photographers' Association of America will be held in Jamestown on June 22-27. From 1,000 to 2,000 representatives from all parts of the country are expected to attend.

The Belfast Telephone Company have poles set about the village and the wire will be strung in a few days. Twenty instruments have been contracted for and will be placed in business places and residences.

County Clerk Geo. A. Green, is taking a much needed vacation and has gone to Mt. Clemens, Mich. Mr. Green has not been well for some time and has gone there to take a course of baths for his health.

Thirty-six business firms of the village of Cuba have organized themselves into a Merchants' Protective Association. The object of the association is to protect themselves against customers who do not pay their bills.

The first epileptic patient has enrolled his name upon the register at Craig Colony. His name is Harvey Paremy. He is twenty six years old and lives at Bath. A young lad from the Allegany county alms house has also been sent to the colony.

Elmira has an epidemic of typhoid fever. Investigation has shown that the cause of the trouble is impure water, which the people of that place take from the Chemung river, and which, it is claimed, is polluted with sewage from Corning, Hornellsville and Bath.

A new and fatal disease has made its appearance among horses south of Attica in the vicinity of Varysburg. It has all the symptoms of poisoning. The afflicted animal becomes entirely paralyzed, which begins with the throat and extends to the fore legs, and then over the entire body. The animal lives only about twelve hours after being first taken with the disease.

Ward Palmer, the fourteen-year-old son of N. W. Palmer, a resident of Hornellsville, was instantly killed near Almond a few days ago. For some time past young Palmer has been in the employ of William Young, of Jersey Hill. He was in the woods with some men who were felling trees, when one of the trees crushed young Palmer down with it, breaking his neck and killing him instantly.

Rumor says that the Erie railroad company will extend the Buffalo division to Corning in place of Hornellsville as at present. It is further said that the divisions of the company will be extended all the distance to New York and that one will be abrogated in having it consolidated into the others. This, it is said, will be done to reduce expenses, and is the result of the new management of Vice President W. F. Merrill.

A bill has been introduced in the Legislature of this State to raise the legal standard of milk. Under the present law milk must contain at least three per cent. of butter fat, and under the bill above mentioned four per cent. is the least amount that milk shall contain without being classed as "adulterated milk." As the milk given by many of the prominent breeds of cows contains only about 3 1/2 per cent. of butter fat, naturally the dairymen of the State are much exercised over the above mentioned bill. The lawmakers at Albany interfere altogether too much with matters that are all right as they exist. A bill to regulate the amount of rain that should fall during a season would be as practicable as the one referred to, and its enforcement would be of much greater benefit to farmers and the community in general.

The 1896 bicycles will be slightly different from former models. The tread will be narrower and the handle bars shorter. Heavier tires will be used on the road models, which will increase the weight slightly. Larger tubing is to be used and nearly every maker is endeavoring to do away with the cotter pins in the cranks and simplify the changeable sprocket. More tandems will be manufactured than ever before.
