At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Ellipton, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

ARTICLE 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions or respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

ARTICLE 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

ARTICLE 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

It is ordered, that all final applications of persons to be admitted to become citizens of the United States, made in the Supreme Court, in the Counties of Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Genesee, Niagara, Orleans and Wyoming, shall be made on the final action had thereon, on the first day of any term of said Court, held in either of said Counties, at two o'clock in the afternoon, and upon such other day in such term designated by the Justice presiding thereat, provided that no such application entered on the docket of said Court for the first day of such term shall be considered as such term.
