Could the vessel be tapped from below and the water drawn off, no amount of freezing would be sufficient to crack or bulge the ice layer on the surface.— St. Louis Republic.

Aluminum in Ships.

In a recent lecture on the use of aluminum in vessel construction. Mr. Yarrow, the English shipbuilder, who has given the subject considerable at-tention, declared that the two great enemies of aluminum are heat and alkalies; that the metal anneals at a amens, that the metal amens at a comparatively low degree of temperature, thus, of course, losing some of its frength, while alkalies act very capidly upon it. In view of these facts Mr. Yarrow is of the opinion that any part liable to be subjected to a considerable rise of temperature should not erable rise of temperature should not erable rise of temperature should not be made of aluminum, nor should it be employed for a condenser where soda may be required for the cleaning pur-poses. At high temperature aluminum is found to oxidize with exceptional rapidity; at low temperature it does not oxidize with such rapidity, and the film of oxide on the surface protects it from further action.
