During the lull in the tail twisting proceedings congress has managed to find sufficient time to pay its respect once more to Ambassador Bayard.

The Kentucky legislature and militia has lately furnished some strong arguments for the election of United States Senators by direct vote.

The mortgages on the estates of Russian noblemen are said to foot up \$632,500,000. Thus does the demand for American wives increase.

The state agricultural department just now has the biggest case in its history on its hands. It has sued the Armour for \$500,000 for the alleged selling of oleomargarine in this state during the continuance of an injunction.

The Brooklyn Eagle says that the New York World is the embodiment of all that the lower regions contain. If the statement is true there is no need of going into the next world for "future punishment." Possibly the reporter who made the comparison "sized up" the lower regions a little too harshly.

Careful estimates indicate that the laines law will increase the local revenues from excise \$2,500,000 in the various towns and cities of the State, besides yielding to the State treasury, to be applied to the reduction of State taxes, the further sum of \$2,900,000. This money will all come from the extra taxes levied upon the liquor traffic.

Plans are being formulated for holding a national conference in the city of Washington on April 22 and 23, to express the general conviction that a permanent system of arbitration should be provided for the settlement of difficulties that may arise between the United States and Great Britain. This is the result of public meetings that have been held in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, and other cities, and an informal conference that was held in Washington a few weeks ago. It is desired that all parts of the country should be fully represented at the conference, and in order that this may be assured invitations have been sent out to representative men irrespective of party or sect in every state and territory in the union. It will doubtless be an easy matter to show that the sentiment of the whole country is overwhelmingly in favor of the policy as expressed above, but it may be quite another matter to convince members of the national Congress that such a sentiment exists, when some of them happen to think that the time has come to make a few more "war speeches."
