Where the Money Went.

The Rev. Luther McSweeney says in The Catholic World: "A great manufacturing company in Massachusetts recently paid their workmen on Saturday evening 700 \$10 bills, each bill being marked. By the following Tuesday 410 of these marked bills were deposited in the bank by saloon keepers of the town. Four thousand and one hundred dollars had passed from the hands of the workmen on Saturday night and Sunday and left them nothing to show for this great sum of money but headaches and poverty in their homes. Well might those men cry out to the state, 'Save us from ourselves' and their hapless wives and children, 'Save us from our husbands and fathers on the Lord's day at least!'"

A general order was read in all the police stations of New York City on the morning of February 14th to outgoing men, telling them to keep close watch on the candy stores to see that no brandy drops or other confections having liquors enclosed were sold, and to arrest such sellers on the charge of violating the excise law. This order was issued by the Chief of Police at the instance of the commissioners on the complaint made by some women who said that candy containing brandy was being largely sold to children!

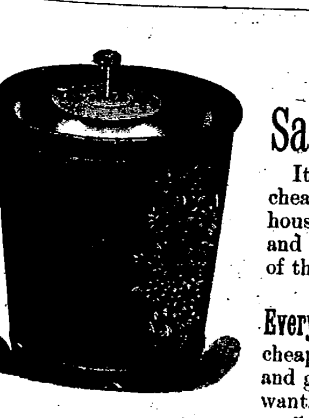
