MR. ROBBINS' SPEECH.

Hon. Fred A. Robbins, Member of Assembly from this county, took the lead in the lower house in the opposition to the Greater New York bill. With what ability Mr. Robbins discharges his duties in the Assembly may be inferred from the following, which is from the Albany Journal of last Thursday:

"The Greater New York bill was on special order for today, the first thing after the reading of the journal. Mr. Brennan of Kings obtained the floor as soon as the order was announced and moved to strike out the enacting clause, and with a few remarks gave way to Mr. Robbins of Allegany. Mr. Robbins delivered a strong and eloquent speech, which held the attention of most of the members. It covered the ground in opposition to the bill as no Senator covered it on the other side of the Capitol. His appeal to the country members to remember that Greater New York meant in the future the control of the Legislature by the city as against the country, was an argument which bore one of the weightiest appeals to the majority in the Legislature that could possibly have been made. As he sat down, the House broke into a storm of applause, the first of any character of the session. His speech has elicited considerable complimentary allusion. It was a powerful argument."
