The popularity of the "man on horseback" in this country is attested by seven equestrian statues at Washington. The Austrians come next; they have five at Vienna.

If the late Benjamin F. Butler were alive he would greatly enjoy the controversy which has followed the proposition to erect a monument to his memory; controversy was Ben's strong point.

The third salvation army, under the imposing name of The American League of the Grand Army of the Cross, has taken the field. The devil knows too much to divide his army into sections.

Secretary Carlisle has given out a letter declining to enter the contest for the Democratic nomination for the presidency. In his letter he says the success of the Democratic party depends more upon its principles, especially on the monetary question, than upon the selection of candidates.

H. H. Holmes, the noted murderer, who is now in prison awaiting execution for the murder of Benjamin Pitzel, has, it is said, wrote a confession wherein he states that he has killed 20 persons. It seems Holmes has made his confession to correspond with the number of murders he was accused of.

The most favorable estimate yet made by a disinterested editor gives McKinley 393 votes on the first ballot of the St. Louis convention, which will be 62 short of the number needed to nominate. The same authority assigns 353 votes to the other five candidates, and puts 163 in the doubtful column.

The Hon. Maynard N. Clement, of Canandaigua, has been appointed deputy State Commissioner of Excise. Mr. Clement is a native of Ontario county and about 38 years of age. He served as district attorney of Ontario, and was succeeded by his law partner, Royal R. Scott. Mr. Clement was backed for the position by Senator Laines, six or seven Supreme Court justices, and a large number of prominent Central New York Republicans.

Colonel W. C. P. Breckinridge has been quietly practicing law at Lexington, Ky., ever since the suit for damages of Madeline Pollard, two years ago. Although Miss Pollard got a judgment for \$15,000, she has never been able to recover anything. Now Colonel Breckinridge is again canvassing his district to run for Congress this year, and the old movement of the women in the district is being reorganized to fight him, but the friends of "Kentucky's silver-tongued orator" express the fullest confidence in his success.

The Legislature of Ohio has passed the Fossick anti-theatre hat bill, which prohibits the wearing of hats in theatres by persons of either sex. The law makes the offence punishable by a fine of \$5, but doubtless no violations of the statute ever will take place, inasmuch as public sentiment will compel the enforcement of the law. The theatre hat nuisance has been discussed in the newspapers for a number of years, humorously and otherwise; but nothing ever came of the argument until the passage of the Fossick measure by the Legislature of Ohio. New York obtained the principle upon which the Raines law is based from the Dow law in Ohio. Now this State will doubtless pass an anti-theatre hat measure. If this thing keeps up much longer, nothing can defeat the nomination of William McKinley at St. Louis.

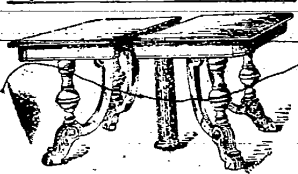

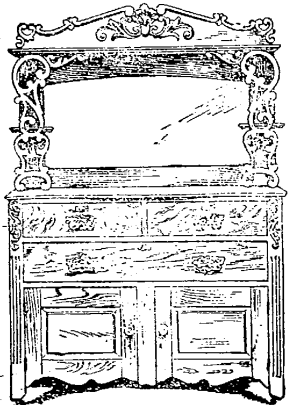

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.
Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.
