There are millions of these rats on the island, and, as they only eat grasses, roots, and tubers, the chances of carrying off the pests by poison are very problematical.

Deep Water.

Some spots have recently been found in the South Pacific Ocean where the water is deeper than anywhere hitherto known.

Her Majesty's surveying ship Penguin, while returning from the Fonga group to New-Zealand, has sounded in Free places, where the depth exceeds 5,000 fathoms. Up to the present the deepest water found was to the northeastward of Japan, where, in 1874, the United States steamer Tüscarors obtained a cast of 4,655 fathoms. The Penguin's soundings are 5,022, 5,147, and 5,155 fathoms. The increase is, therefore, 500 fathoms of 3,900 feet.


These soundings are separated from one another by water much less deep, and the holes may not be connected. The distance from the two extreme soundings, and prove to be the usual red clay found in all the deepest parts of the oceans.

These soundings afford additional evidence of the observed fact that the deepest holes are not in the centres of the oceans, but are near land, as two of them are within 100 miles of islands of the Kermadec group, and the other not far from a shoal.
