It is most sincerely to be hoped that greater New York will not develop any greater rascals than old New York has turned out upon occasions.

If the revival of Olympian games at Athens, Greece, was intended to lessen public interest in the opening of our baseball season, success has been missed.

The marriage of ex President Harrison and Mrs. Dummick, which took place last week Monday, reminds one of the marriage of Adam and Eve. There were no relatives present.

In a western city a woman sued her husband for divorce. Before the trial came off the pair had kissed and made up. When the case was called in court the woman's lawyer rose and said: "I understand, your honor, that the plaintiff in this case has eloped with the defendant." The case was dismissed.

A serious illness, lasting four months, so affected Boss Skaggs, of Lawrence county, Ky., that he lost 220 pounds of flesh. His weight now is only 330; before his illness he weighed 550 pounds. He could stand another run of illness and be in no danger of drying up and blowing away.

A Cincinnati clergyman writes to the commissioner of patents that he is anxious to buy a bicycle for his daughter, but is unable to decide which of the many designs offered him is the best, and wants official advice on the subject. The lower house of the Ohio legislature has passed an anti treating bill, and it is said the measure will pass the Senate with little opposition and will become a law. The bill provides that whoever treats or offers to treat another person to an intoxicating drink, or whoever gives or offers to give to another person an intoxicating drink in any place where intoxicating liquor is sold, is guilty of a misdemeanor. If the treating habit were done away with in this country the liquor problem would be more than half solved.

During the past twelve years more than a hundred persons have been killed on the Main street of the town of Jackson, county seat of Breathitt county, Ky., according to the estimate of a resident. All these persons were "shot off on the square; nary a case of bushwackin'." The front of the Court House and some of the stores on the street are chipped and scarred very noticeably where promiscuously flying bullets have struck. Only one man has ever been hanged in Breathitt county, and he was borrowed from another county to be used as an object lesson.

The curfew has become a popular institution in the West. Omaha is the latest of the larger cities to adopt it. At a certain hour every evening, in some places nine o'clock and in others ten, the bells are rung, when all children under sixteen years of age must be at home. If found in the streets after those hours they will be arrested. The West is wild and woolly but it is also progressive and it sees that boys and girls who roam the streets in the evenings are not going to become good citizens when they grow up. It does not propose to educate a generation of criminals and degenerates in the school of the public street.

Even after his withdrawal from the presidential contest, Benjamin Harrison is more feared as a candidate than some who could be mentioned who are still in the race.

The joyous chuckle of the happy young bridegroom, Benjamin Harrison, indicates that one man has found it possible to relinquish a presidential boom and still be very well contented.

Governor Morton has signed the bill enabling common school districts to contract with Union school districts for the education of children. Under the provisions of this law all the school districts in any town can pay an agreed sum to the village district and hire a man or men to convey their children to and from the latter. The saving to the smaller country districts under this arrangement, would be considerable, and the benefit to country district children incalculable but great. The system is in operation in Massachusetts and gives universal satisfaction.

It was supposed that the ancient southern gentlemen who wanted pay "for the niggers he lost in the war" was extinct, but it appears that he has sufficient vitality remaining to organize a movement to recover an indemnity from the government for the value of his slaves, or at least to possess sufficient credulity to induce a party of speculators to make game of him. There was incorporated in Washington about two weeks ago what is known as the "United States ex-slaveholders' registration bureau." It has rented offices in a prominent business block and is sending out circulars, as its officers explain, for the purpose of securing a record of all slaves owned on the 1st of January, 1863. Printed instructions and registration blanks have been distributed broadcast through the south, which are to be filled out by the ex-slaveholders or his heirs so as to show the name, age and individual value of each item of that sort of property. It must then be sworn to and forwarded to the bureau with a fee ranging in amount according to the number of slaves or the value of the property involved. Upon the receipt of the affidavit and the fee the bureau will send to the subscriber a certificate of acknowledgment. This is all he gets for the present, and he will then be asked to wait the development of a movement to induce the government of the United States to reimburse for this claim.
