Prohibiting the employment of women and girls as barmaids, 1892.

Prohibiting opening of State's exhibit at World's Fair on Sunday, 1892.

Strengthening Scientific Temperance Law, 1895.

Successful Protest, preventing introduction of the bill into the Legislature legalizing houses of prostitution, 1892.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

Lilly Dale residents are preparing to celebrate the 15th anniversary of modern spiritualism. The date is April 28.

Two new steamers will be placed on Silver Lake this season and many new cottages will be built on both the Assembly and Pioneer grounds.

A Canandaigua farmer is using potatoes for fuel. He says they make a very hot and steady fire. They may be used in coal stoves with good effect.

The officers of the Friendship Water Works Company are considering proposals for construction and the work will be under way by May 1st.

Eugene Allen, the Erie agent at Wellsville, has been promoted to the position of freight agent at Binghamton. W. S. Kigdon of Dayton will be agent at Wellsville.

Pat Burke and the Sheehan brothers have filed their claims against the town of Canadea for \$10,000 damages for the drowning of Frank Burke and Will Sheehan, which occurred there several months ago.

The coroner's jury empaneled to investigate the death of the infant whose body was found in a snow bank on the Lyman Cook farm in Hartsville, returned a verdict to the effect that the infant came to its death from natural causes.

Mrs. Stewart Mosier, formerly Lottie Finch, attempted suicide, last night, by taking chloroform. She was found by Mosier's daughter insensible on the floor. Dr. Colfer was called and at midnight pronounced the woman as probably out of danger. The couple were married last December and are said not to live as peacefully together as man and wife should.

A stock company has been formed in Wellsville to publish a daily and weekly newspaper in the interests of the anti-Glenn republican faction. F. L. Steeprod of this city will have charge of the mechanical department and has just returned from Buffalo where he selected the type and machinery. The first issue of the paper will make its appearance in about three weeks.

The Allegany County Sunday School Association will hold its annual convention at Alfred May 12 and 13. Among the speakers will be Rev. G. B. F. Hallack, assistant pastor of the Brick Presbyterian church of Rochester, Rev. F. H. Cowman and Rev. C. B. Perkins of Wellsville, Rev. W. B. Wagoner of Andover, and others whose acceptance has not yet been received but will undoubtedly be present.

What has become of Claud L. Ricker is the question that's troubling the friends of that young man in Wellsville. On Wednesday morning, April 1st, he started for school, as usual, but did not go to school that day. He was seen on the street in the afternoon between three and four and has not been seen or heard of since.

Under Sheriff Hodnett and Deputy Sheriff Johnson arrested Charles and Archie Little and William Maxon, all former residents of Cuba, at Belmont last Monday for being connected with various burglaries in this village and vicinity perpetrated within the last few months. Sheriff Swift and his deputies have had the gang under surveillance for some time past.

They were found in an old house just across the river from the village, where they had been keeping bachelors hall. The upper rooms of the house are ceiled and between that and the roof has been the repository of their stolen goods. Clothing, shoes, gloves, neckwear, stumps, and numerous other articles to the amount of between \$100 and \$200 were found about the house, and some goods traced to where they had been disposed of. From the goods found and the evidence collected there is no doubt of their being the parties who broke into the Boston Clothing Store the last time it was entered and the Erie depot and Bates shop in this place last week.

Their latest robberies were a general store at Withey's, near Belmont, last Saturday night and a store at Nichols last Sunday night. They will be brought before the June grand jury for indictment unless they plead guilty and are sentenced at that time.

At a meeting of the Allegany County Fishermen's Association, held at Holtz, April 23, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892.

Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices or entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents, to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.
