The body of Will Holcomb, who was killed by the cars at Kent, Ohio, last week, was taken to Geneva, Ind., for burial. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Holcomb, arrived in Kent the day after the accident occurred.

Elias Green, a former resident of this place, lately of Hornellsville, was in town Monday. Mr. Green's wife died in February, a fact known to but few people here. She had a stroke of apoplexy and died suddenly.

Rev. G. M. Jones is in attendance at the meeting of the Steuben Presbytery, which is being held this week in Atlanta, Steuben county. He is accompanied by several members of his church and congregation.

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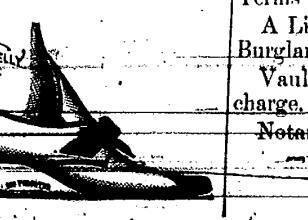
