The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Andover meets the first and third Thursday in each month.

Mrs. Ingalls, of St. Louis, president of the W. C. T. U., recently learned that in St. Louis there are at least two hundred pest houses, politely known as "city dairies." In these hot beds of disease two thousand cows are shut up to "sour-mash" from the brewery and their milk is sent to the poorer class of the population and to a large extent "spooned out" to little children. No sooner had Mrs. Ingalls received this "arrest of thought" than she ordered her carriage and taking two other white ribbons with her they went forth accompanied by officers who had authority to gain admission for them, and proceeded to investigate some of these "city dairies."

They found shut up in stables (the ammonia-laden air of which was almost unendurable) any where from five to fifty or more wretched-looking cows, without light or fresh air, and with no bedding whatever, and no food but "sour mash." The owners said that the average life of these poor creatures is about six months, sometimes a year, and on being asked what was done with them when the end of their career as "milkers" came, the cheerful answer was, "Why, as a matter of course, they are sold to the butchers."

The cows stand chained by the neck, on a hard platform, and without a particle of bedding, until death gives them release. They become ravenous for the "sour mash," and they are shut up because it is thought that fresh air diminishes their milk-producing qualities!

Our comrades have appealed not only to the "city fathers" (?) for an ordinance, but to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and in an interview Mrs. Ingalls pointedly says: "Oh, mothers of St. Louis, while you sit quietly at home and rock the cradle, the milkman is bringing death and disease to your very door in his tin cans. In the name of the little ones, awake to the danger that invades your home—the saloon, the cigarette factory and the milk dairies. And, now, gentlemen of St. Louis, what are you going to do about it? If you will not allow your wives, your mothers, your daughters, to help run the city government, do try to be more humane yourselves, and in the name of common decency, if you won't let us help do something about this abomination, if not for the babies, at least pity the poor brutes."

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

The Patriot says the Erie company will begin work right away on the new depot in Cuba.

Cuba has elected McKinley delegate to the Republican District Convention to be held in Olean May 15.

The Standard Oil Company is planning to erect an acid manufactory at North Olean. The plant will cost \$30,000.

A June race meet in Wellsville will probably occur somewhere about the 15th of the month, the week before the Bradford races.

A Mr. Willoughby of Penn Yan has been appointed excise inspector under the new Raines law for the Hornellsville Senatorial district and Charles J. Clark of Hornellsville has been made the attorney.

The population of Bolivar is 1,169, according to a census recently taken at the suggestion of County Treasurer Ricker in order to determine the amount of tax to be levied on the liquor dealers under the Raines law.

The graduating class of the Geneseo Normal School for 1896 will be the largest in the history of the school. There are in all 117 persons who will receive diplomas. They are nearly all, with two exceptions, residents of New York state.

Melvil Dewey, of Albany, Secretary of the Regents of the University of the State of New York, and Director of the State Library, will lecture in Alfred University chapel, Thursday evening, May 29th, on "Higher Education and the State."

D. R. Matson of Bolivar has leased for oil purposes 2,500 acres of land in New-Hudson. He has a rig under way on the Bennett farm 4 miles from Orangetown. The venture is what is termed a "wildcat" one. The Emery Oil Co. of Bradford is interested in the leases.

The Petrolia correspondent of the Wellsville Reporter calls attention to the fact that the rig at Triangle No. 1, the first producing well in the Allegheny field, is being torn down. It will go up again, however, at No. 2. The well is the property of Macken and Breckenridge, and though 17 years old, still produces oil in paying quantities.

Editor A. E. Cowies of the Wellsville Democrat, has purchased the old Catholic convent property in Wellsville, and will convert the convent into a modern residence. This is one of the most desirable locations in Wellsville. The property and improvements will call for an expenditure of about \$5,000. It isn't every country editor who can indulge in the luxury of a \$5,000 residence, but Mr. Cowies deserves all the good things that come his way.—*Rolling Press.*

The famous seven-year-old pacing mare Moonstone, with a record of 2:30, is now in training on the Wellsville race track. She was sold in New York last Thursday for \$1,500. Of late Wellsville has come to be a great horse town, says the Reporter. It is the home of Wm. Duke, Jr., the great running horse owner; the Cobb string of 20 horses train here this season, many of J. H. Clarke's best horses will be put in condition on our track by Fitch Crane, and any number of local trotters, pacers and runners will start from Wellsville this year.
