It seems to be difficult to realize that it is only 287 years since the first settlement of America, but the 287th Jamestown anniversary has just been celebrated, on the spot.

A metropolitan newspaper used four columns to tell its readers that Gov. McKinley has refused to be interviewed on the financial question, and they call that "enterprise."

Casting the largest electoral vote of all the states, and posing as the pivotal state in every presidential election," says the Syracuse Times, "the empire state of New York has never yet furnished to the Republican party, during its forty years of existence, a single presidential candidate. At the second national convention of that party this state presented as her candidate the most distinguished statesman of the party, Wm. H. Seward. The party was twenty years old before a New Yorker was given even a second place on a Republican national ticket. During the past twenty years every Republican candidate for vice-president has been a New Yorker save one. That was in 1864, when the ticket was Blaine and Logan. Another interesting fact is that during these two decades the successful ticket has every time had on it the name of a New Yorker—in the two contests in which the Republican ticket was defeated, a New Yorker, Grover Cleveland, heading the winning ticket.

The delegates to the Republican National Convention have now all been chosen, and while Mr. McKinley's nomination is conceded by all except a few of the more prominent party leaders who have been opposed to it from the first, yet the friends of the Ohio protectionist should not be too confident. Some of his most ardent admirers are predicting his nomination by acclamation, but they forget that delegates have been instructed for other candidates and it is safe to say they will obey their instructions, which will of course necessitate a ballot, if only as a matter of form. It should also be remembered that a majority of the delegates are not instructed for McKinley, although it is conceded by many that he will have upwards of 600 votes on the first ballot. But politics is a queer game, and if the votes of all the delegates who are not instructed for McKinley should be concentrated on another person, that person would win. There is very little probability of this, but it is well enough for the people to understand the possibilities of the case. There is one thing that may safely be relied on, and that is that if McKinley is not nominated (it will be somebody who will represent Republican principles, which is all Mr. McKinley can do.
