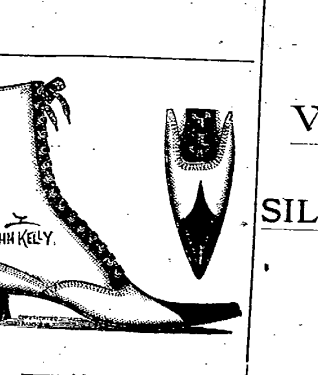
Miss Gean Brundage was in Hornellsville yesterday.

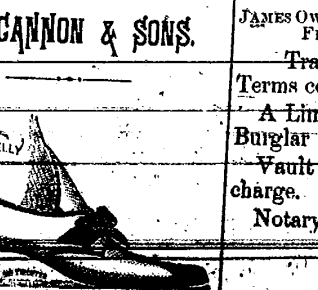
