Maj. McKinley notes, of course, that the inaugural services at Washington are never so imposing as those now taking place in Moscow, but they are perfectly satisfactory to him just the same.

Complaint is made that the fireworks at Moscow in honor of the coronation of the Czar, are not a great success. Possibly the Nihilists will contribute something startling before the festivities are over.

The Methodist General Conference at Cleveland has refused to change the wording of the discipline of the church which forbids cards, dancing, the theatre, the circus and other amusements. Of course, this refusal is what many declare to be liberal, is a matter of interest more to Methodists or to those who intend to unite with that church, than to others. However, some Methodists believe that a change should be made, though there were few votes recorded in favor of it at Cleveland.

The prediction is freely made that the free silver element will control the Democratic National Convention in Chicago. In this case it is not unlikely that another convention will be held by the sound money Democrats, who will nominate a sound money man for President, thus dividing the strength of the party. This would undoubtedly result in the defeat of both Democratic nominees, but it might also hasten the time when the financial question shall come to the front as the absorbing issue in politics. That this question must be settled sooner or later, to the exclusion of other issues, is contended by men of all parties.

Republicans of Allegany county are to return Hon. Fred A. Robbins to the assembly, and it is understood that he will be a candidate for the speakership. How well qualified Mr. Robbins may be in parliamentary usages and tactics is not in evidence, but certainly no man in the past two sessions of the lower branch of the legislature has enjoyed a greater reputation for rugged honesty than he, and no man in that body has taken a more pronounced stand in fighting questionable legislation. These facts ought to give Mr. Robbins a strong lead in a contest for the responsible position of presiding officer of the assembly.—*Olean Times*.
