F. M. Lee of Tip Top is engaging quite largely in strawberry culture this season. John Prest has repaired the interior of the opera house, and a great improvement is apparent. The Baptist Mission Band will serve ice cream on Saturday, Decoration Day, in the vacant store next D. K. Porter's hardware store.

There is an unusually large acreage under the plow hereabout this season, necessitated by the absence of promising meadow lands. Mrs. J. G. Wilson of Wellsville, Mrs. W. W. Kimball of Hornellsville, and Miss Rena Lester of Richburg visited J. W. Richardson's family last week. Considerable space is devoted to local base ball matters by many of our county exchanges. Ball playing in Andover has been indulged in mostly on the streets, in violation of a village ordinance.

The sidewalk viewers will make the rounds of the village about June 4th. Those whose walks need repairs are requested to attend to the same before that date, as a notice to make repairs will be served on all whose walks are defective at that time. Just as we are going to press we learn of the death, at Corning last night, of Very Rev. Dean Colgan. He was 71 years of age. Had been a priest of this diocese 46 years, 36 of which he has been pastor of St. Mary's Church at Corning. He is remembered by some of our old citizens here at Andover.

The names of the Decoration Day orators for a few of the Allegany county towns are as follows: Alfred, Col. Archie E. Baxter of Elmira; Andover, Rev. J. J. Dealey of Belmont; Angelica, Hon. F. A. Robbins; Belmont, Hon. Sheridan Gorton of Smethport, Pa.; Cuba, Chas. H. Brown of Belmont; Fillmore, O. A. Fuller of Wellsville; Friendship, Judge E. W. Hatch of Buffalo; Scio, Rev. Father Smith of Limestone, N. Y.; Whitesville, F. C. White. Dr. H. A. Barney and Elba Reynolds, of Belmont, were in town Monday. These gentlemen are members of the board of water commissioners of that place, and were here to get pointers on matters connected with constructing a system of water works. A vote is to be taken in Belmont next month on a proposition to issue bonds for this purpose. If the water works could be built and used a year before the vote were taken, there would not be half a dozen negative votes.

A large congregation attended the memorial services at the Presbyterian church last Sunday evening. The interior of the church was handsomely decorated with flags and flowers. Rev. L. A. Platts conducted the services, the pastors of the village being away from home. The Presbyterian choir furnished special music for the occasion. Mr. Platts delivered an eloquent and scholarly sermon, and it was fortunate for all concerned that in the enforced absence of the other pastors he consented to conduct the services. Dr. F. E. Comstock of this place will remove to Wellsville about the first of June, and will continue the practice of his profession in that place. He has purchased an interest in the opera house block there and will have offices and living rooms in the same. The doctor has lately had considerable business in his line in Wellsville, and no doubt the removal is the result of a desire to extend his field. We are sorry to note the removal of Dr. Comstock and his wife from this place, but are sure that all will unite in wishing them continued success. We are also glad that he is to be located no further away, and hope he may find time to be "neighborly" with old friends.

The Bolivar Breeze says: "For several years the subject of a gravity system of water works for Bolivar has been discussed. A well attended meeting of taxpayers was held at the opera house, Monday evening, and the indications are that the question will be submitted to a vote within a few weeks. In order to secure the needed information, the chairman was instructed to appoint a committee of five, to correspond with the officials of Cuba, Andover, Bradford, and other towns and cities that control their own water supply. The committee appointed is composed of J. B. Bradley, T. Devlin, R. L. Andrus, Louis Seibert and G. A. Root. The committee will report at a meeting to be held at the opera house, Monday evening, June 2nd."

Uriah Davis is seriously ill with pneumonia at his home about three miles southeast of this village. His condition is critical, and there is little prospect of his recovery. We are pleased to note that many of our best citizens are interested in establishing a library association, which we hope will be a complete success.
