HONORING THE SOLDIER DEAD.
 Memorial Day Exercises in Andover Highly Appropriate and Successful.

We think there never was a year when the observance of Memorial Day in Andover was a greater success from every point of view than it was last Saturday. A large number of people were in attendance and the exercises throughout were of a decidedly appropriate character. The procession to the cemetery moved at 1:30 p. m. At the head was the Andover Martial Band. Among those in line were the village officers and speaker of the day in carriages, Seaman Post, No. 481, G. A. R., the Citizens' Hose Company, the students and teachers of the school, and citizens. The usual exercises at the cemetery were had, when the procession reformed and marched to Prest's opera house, which was crowded with people, many of whom could not find seats. The general orders and roll of the dead were read by the Adjutant of the Post, after which the programme that had been arranged was carried out. The music was furnished by the Baptist choir and was most appropriate to the occasion and rendered with the degree of proficiency which is always to be expected from this company of singers. A song was also given by a quartette from the school, which was pleasing and appropriate. Miss Sara Barney read Will Carlton's poem entitled "Cover Them Over," and received much praise for her successful effort.

An unexpected feature of the afternoon was the reciting of a selection by Harry C. Franck, A. M., President of the American College of Elocution of New York city. Prof. Franck accompanied the speaker of the day to this place, and his fortunate presence gave the audience opportunity to hear a most appropriate selection rendered in artistic style. Mr. McGibeny of Belmont was also present and contributed a song which was much enjoyed.

The great feature of the day, however, was the splendid oration delivered by Rev. J. J. Dealy, rector of St. Mary's church of Belmont. But few persons in this place had ever listened to Father Dealy, but all knew him by reputation. He delivered a remarkably eloquent and patriotic speech, holding the attention of the audience as few speakers are able to do. His remarks overflowed with the true spirit of patriotism, and his tribute to the union soldiers, living and dead, shows the love he bears for the preservers of the union. Father Dealy's friends in Andover are numbered by hundreds, and all will be glad of an opportunity to listen to him again.

Death of Uriah Davis.

Uriah Davis, whose illness was mentioned last week, died on Thursday, May 28, 1896. He was 58 years of age. The disease that took him away was typhoid pneumonia, from which he had been suffering about a week.

The funeral services were held at his late residence, about three miles southeast of this village, last Saturday forenoon and were attended by a very large concourse of people. Rev. J. Kenyon of Independence officiated. The burial took place at Green's Corners.

In the death of Mr. Davis this town loses a good citizen. He was widely known as a progressive farmer and a close student of the great political and commercial questions of the day. He was independent in his action and cast his influence in the direction from which he believed the greatest good for the people at large would come. His sincerity and integrity were unquestioned, and he was largely possessed of those qualities which go to make up the best element in society.

The parents of the deceased, Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy C. Davis of this town are living. He also leaves a widow and three sons: Charles, Lewis and LeRoy.

Silver Lake Assembly.

The Silver Lake Assembly will be held this year from July 7th to August 23th. The platform talent includes the names of Dr. J. M. Buckley, Governor Morton, Bishop Charles H. Fowler, Theodore Roosevelt, Sam Jones, John Wanamaker, Russell H. Conwell, John DeWitt Miller and many others speakers of national reputation. The Silver Lake Orchestra will be under the direction of Dr. LaFrone Merriman of Hornellsville.

The School of Physical Training will again be under the direction of Prof. B. B. Brown of this place and George W. Brush of Buffalo. There will be instruction in light and heavy gymnastics, field athletics, etc. A complete faculty has been engaged.

The outdoor amusements will include boating, bathing, cycling, base ball, etc. The base ball club will be even a stronger one than last year, and will include H. G. Watson of Yale University, A. B. Burris of Washington College, Md., E. K. Bowzer of Harvard, E. G. Miller of the Western Medical College, W. S. Mulholland of Syracuse University, Messrs. Peck and Halleren of Genesee Wesleyan Seminary, and others. A day of Field Sports will be held August 12, at which among other attractions will be J. M. Gibbons of the University of the State of Pennsylvania, who will give an exhibition of fancy bicycle riding. A bicycle meet will be held August 6, for which suitable prizes will be given.

Altogether Silver Lake will this year doubtless prove an attractive place and the attendance throughout will be large.

INJURED BY POWDER.

Albert Gayhart of Hartsville, receives the Full Force of a Premature Explosion While Blowing Out Stumps.

Albert Gayhart, a young man in the employ of Wm. Clark of Hartsville, met with an unfortunate accident last Saturday morning. He was blowing out stumps with giant powder, when a charge exploded in his face and neck. The powder entered his eyes, and while the greater force of the shock seems to have been received by the lower part of his face and neck, yet the greater danger of serious results lies in the possible loss of sight. The membrane of the eyes was completely burned away, and at present the inflammation in those organs is very high. It will take some days to determine the extent of the injuries in this respect.

Immediately after the accident Gayhart was brought to this village where he was treated by Dr. O'Donnell. After the preliminary dressing had been completed he was removed to Mrs. Wilcox's sanitarium, where he will probably remain while the necessity for constant attention exists.

The commencement exercises of Alfred University will occur June 20-25 inclusive. This will be the sixtieth anniversary of the institution, and great effort is being made by the management to render the occasion of unusual interest. A memorial address will be given on Alumni Day in memory of the late President Allen.

The tenth annual reunion of the Allegany County Prisoners of War Association will be held at Friendship Wednesday, June 17, 1896. It will be a basket picnic.

A bill signed by Gov. Morton last week amends the county law and provides that keepers of county jails shall cause each prisoner committed to their charge for imprisonment under sentence, to be constantly employed at labor when practicable during every day except Sunday, and the Board of Supervisors or judge of the county, may prescribe the kind of labor at which each prisoner shall be employed; cause such of the convicts under his charge as are capable of hard labor, to be employed outside of the jail in the same or adjoining county, upon such terms as may be agreed upon between the keepers and the officers or persons under whose direction such convicts shall be placed, subject to such regulations as the board or judge may prescribe; and the Board of Supervisors of the several counties are authorized to employ convicts under sentence of confinement in the county jails, in building and repairing penal institutions of the county and building and repairing the highways in their respective counties or in preparing the materials for such highways.

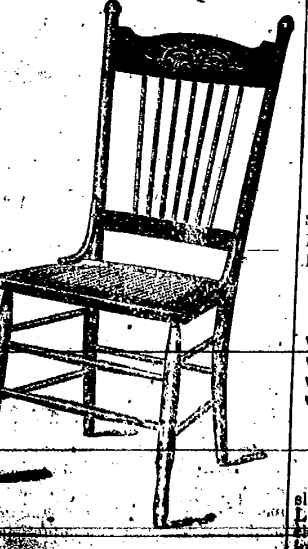
