That the silver men will control the Chicago convention is almost certain; that they will adopt a silver platform is extremely doubtful.

It is about a week since St. Louis was visited by a destructive cyclone, and we haven't yet seen in any paper a reference to the cyclone that will visit that city the 16th of this month, but which will confine its destructive work to all but one of the candidates for the Republican nomination.

This thing is getting a little confusing. If the silver Republicans bolt at St. Louis, and the gold Democrats at Chicago, does that mean that the silver Republicans will support the Chicago ticket and the gold Democrats the St. Louis ticket? and where do the Populists come in?

Cyclones have been reported to accomplish nearly every conceivable kind of work, but until recently we never heard that a man's tooth had been pulled by a "twister" of this kind. A Louisville man now comes forward with the story that on his way to a dentist's he was overtaken by a cyclone and that when he recovered consciousness his aching tooth was missing.

The Viceroy of China, Li Hung Chang, is coming to America, and he is bringing his coffin with him. In China it is the custom for wealthy men to purchase the caskets in which they intend to be buried and they remain a suggestive part of the household furniture until the owner's death.

THE NEW ELECTION CODE.

A long step has been made toward the simplification and purification of elections by Governor Morton's action in signing the Raines Election Code.

New York has given more time and attention to the question of electoral reform than any other state in the Union, and the progress and reform that have been effected in that direction is the result of the most patient effort and unwearied study.

The Election Code puts into one act all the election and registration laws of the state. Hereafter, "before every general election the boards of inspectors for each election district in every city and in villages having 500 inhabitants or more shall hold four meetings for the registration of the electors thereof, at the places designated therefore, on the fourth Friday, fourth Saturday, and third Friday and third Saturday before such election." This provides for a sweeping change in the registration law, the law hereafter making registration days the same throughout the state, the only difference being in the time the registry offices being open in cities of the first class

and in other cities and villages. The polls also shall open and close at the same hour throughout the state.

The principal amendment to former election laws was to increase the number of signatures required for independent nominations. It is now required that 6,000 names be required for a state nomination, "provided, that in making up such number at least 50 electors in each county of the state" shall subscribe to the certificate. Independent nominations for municipal offices can only be made in a city of the first class by 2,000 electors; in cities of the second class by 1,000 electors, and in other cities by 500 electors thereof.

The purpose is to check the expensive, and sometimes irrational movements which have been named "independent movements." The Code aims at simplification and efficiency all around, and in view of New York's experience with the question of electoral reform, it is believed that this result will be achieved.
