Supreme Court.

Supreme Court convened in Belmont
Monday. The first case tried was that
of Helen V. Beebe vs. N. L. Beebe.
The plaintiff was the wife of Jason M.
Beebe, deceased, who was the son of the
defendant. The case arose over a dis-
pute as to the ownership of some per-
sonal property. The case was finished
yesterday and resulted in a verdict for
the plaintiff for \$64. Van Fleet & Phil-
lips were attorneys for Mrs. Beebe and
Crayton L. Earley for Mr. Beebe.

R. R. Bridges Placed "White Iron Wait."

The wooden railroad bridge west of
Andover station was on Monday re-
placed by a new steel bridge, the work
on which has been under way for a num-
ber of weeks. The bridge was construct-
ed and made all complete ready to re-
place the old one, and after train 14 had
passed on Monday the old bridge was
taken away and the new one, which had
been placed on rails, was moved into
position. The whole operation occu-
pied only about two hours' time.

One of the latest of many improve-
ments made by the Erie is their ar-
rangement with the Westcott Express
Company for the transfer of passengers
and baggage in New York and Brook-
lyn. Baggage is checked to and from
hotels and residences, and a feature
made of prompt service at reasonable
rates. Passengers arriving on the Erie
at Jersey City step directly from the
train to the cab or carriage delivering
them to any portion of Greater New
York.

Mrs. Brown Wins.

In the case of Helen M. Brown against
N. B. Sherman as Sheriff and Charles
Dow, which was tried one year ago at
Belmont and a verdict of \$400 rendered
for the plaintiff, Justice Spring, before
whom the case was tried, has just hand-
ed down a decision denying a motion
for a new trial made by defendant up-
on a case and exceptions. The case
was argued at Special Term by J. S.
Phillips for the plaintiff and Judge
Henderson of Chautauqua county for
defendant.

Murder or Suicide?

Last Saturday night Mrs. Charles H.
Jackson, of Dunellen, N. J., was found
dead in her bed, with two bullet holes
in her head. Mrs. Jackson was former-
ly Miss May Carter, and lived in Al-
fred, where her mother and a brother
still reside. About six years ago she
married Mr. Jackson, who is a reporter
for a New York newspaper. A cor-
oner's inquest was held, the jury re-
turning a verdict that the woman was
murdered by her husband. It is said,
however, that there is very little evi-
dence of murder, and the husband's
story is that his wife committed sui-
cide. Miss Carter was well known in
Andover.

Severe Storms.

Last Saturday morning a very heavy
thunder storm visited this section. The
heaviest portion of the storm seemed to
passed in a northeasterly direction be-
tween this place and Byke, which is
about six miles west of here. For a
considerable distance the storm ap-
peared to be in the nature of a cloud
burst, the streams being raised to a very
high point within a brief time, and the
roads being badly damaged in many
places. Lightning struck a number of
houses and barns, among them being
Patrick Baker's house in the corner of
the town of Ward, Wm. Jones' house on
Corwin Hill, about three miles north-
westerly from this village, and Wm.
Curtain's barn on the same hill. A new
house being built by Lewis Berry on
the Luther Green farm in Independence
was also struck. Very little damage
was done to any of the buildings, so far
as we are able to learn. Sunday even-
ing and Monday heavy thunder storms
also visited this section.
