Commenting on the make-up of the St. Louis convention as to the financial question the New York Herald says: "Reports sent by Herald correspondents show that the gold standard men will control 651 of the 918 delegates. Only 78 delegates were chosen in state or territories which adopted free silver platforms, and only nine additional delegates are reported to be in favor of the white metal. The known strength of the silver men is therefore only 87. The remaining 180 delegates were chosen by conventions which ignored or straddled the silver question. They are classed as doubtful, but if all of them should vote with the silver men the total would be only 267, against 651 votes for sound money. This would leave a majority of 384 for the sound standard."
