Mr. Van Fleet gave some facts and figures concerning the Andover plant, and advised the people of Belmont to vote for village ownership. It was good advice and the vote on the proposition, which was taken the next day, showed that the advice was followed. The project was carried by a vote of 24 for and 21 against.

Las. Thursday the tax payers of Belmont voted on the question of expending \$30,000 for water works, to be owned by the village. The project was carried, and Belmont will soon be in line with the other progressive villages in the matter of fire protection and water for domestic use.

The supervisors, town clerks and assessors of the different towns in the state are required, on the first Monday in July, to meet and select a new list of trial jurors, to serve at the different terms of court in their counties during the following three years.
