The American Agriculturist has questioned its readers on leading economic topics. The replies make an interesting showing of sentiment among the farmers of the various sections of the country on the chief issues. First and foremost, it appears that the American farmers do not favor Federal bounties on agricultural exports. The farmers of New England, Middle, Central, Western and Southern States all voted no, and by large majorities. The roll showed no section in favor of such bounties, a fact showing well for the farmers of the United States. On the question of free coinage of American silver, the New England and Middle sections voted no; the Central, Western and Southern sections voted yes. The proportions are exhibited by the following summary: New England—for free silver 65, against, 133; Middle States—for, 369, against, 528; Central States—for, 1,736, against, 1,358; Western States—for, 232, against, 18; Southern States—for, 186, against, 131.

William McKinley has written the platforms for two National Republican Conventions—those of 1884 and 1888. No other man has ever had the honor of writing that document more than once. It is also said that Mr. McKinley has "embodied his ideas" in a memorandum for the use of the platform committee of the St. Louis Convention. The money plank, according to William E. Curtis, the staff representative of the Chicago Record, is as follows:

"The Republican party is in favor of sound money. It is responsible for the resumption of specie payments, and has maintained the currency of the government so that every dollar in circulation is as good as gold. It is pledged to the protection of the public credit, and therefore favors the maintenance of the present gold standard and opposes the free coinage of silver except by international agreement."

The rest of the platform which Major McKinley has prepared refers to the protection of American industry, to the application of the reciprocity principle in equalizing and extending our foreign trade, to the restriction of immigration and to other articles that are usually included in Republican creeds.
