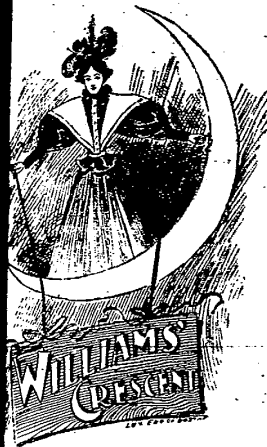

## FOR MCKINLEY AND HOBART.

Andover Republicans Step into Line with an Enthusiastic Campaign Club.

On Monday evening of this week, pursuant to call, a good sized crowd of Republicans met at Prest's opera house for the purpose of forming a McKinley and Hobart Club. The meeting was called to order by J. S. Phillips. T. N. Boyd was elected temporary chairman and Raymond E. Smith, secretary. A committee was appointed to draw up a suitable preamble and pledge to be signed by those who should join the club. A ten minutes' recess was taken to allow the committee to draw up the paper, after which the meeting was again called to order and the report of the committee was read as follows:

"We, the undersigned, do hereby organize ourselves into a club to be known as the McKinley and Hobart Club of Andover, N. Y., whose officers shall consist of a president, six vice presidents, a secretary, an assistant secretary, a treasurer. The president shall appoint an executive committee of five members, of which the president shall be chairman. We hereby endorse the platform adopted by the National Republican Convention of 1896, and pledge ourselves to use every effort to secure the election of the nominees of that convention."

The committee's report was adopted, after which the following officers of the Club were elected:

Treasurer—L. A. Burrows.

A committee was appointed, consisting of C. L. Earley, L. A. Burrows and W. B. Bundy, to solicit funds for carrying on the work of the Club.

A committee was appointed to prepare by-laws for the government of the Club, the committee to report at the next meeting.

Other business of a routine nature was transacted, and the meeting adjourned.

The next meeting will be held at the opera house next Tuesday evening, July 7, at which time the executive committee will be named.
