It is possible that the Republican State convention, to nominate candidates for Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Judge of the Court of Appeals, may be held during the latter part of August or the first part of September. The State Committee will meet next Tuesday to issue the call.

The people of the Asbland District in Kentucky are to have an opportunity to demonstrate whether their rejection of Col. Breckenridge in his Congressional aspirations two years ago was a mere spasm of virtue or a settled and determined purpose. The colonel, who seems to imagine that the public has forgotten his conspicuous offenses against public morals, announces that he will be a candidate for Congress in the district stated at the coming election, and adds that he has all confidence in his success.

Julian Ralph cables from London that there is a glut of money in England. "The banks are full," he says, "choked with idle money for which it is impossible to find any investments that would even pay the cost of the broker's commission. So phenomenally cheap is money in London today that it is possible to borrow practically an unlimited amount at the rate of 25 cents a day for every \$50,000. There is now on deposit in the Bank of England alone more than \$250,000,000 more money than was lying there nine months ago, and the amount on deposit has been steadily mounting up during that period and is still increasing." The greater part of this money would pour into the United States if the owners were given the assurance that they would be repaid in honest money, but with one of the great parties yelling for dishonest money, it is not to be expected that investors will place their money here, not knowing how or how much of it they will get back.

Only once since 1876, when the amended article of the State Constitution extending the Governor's term from two years to three went into effect, has there been in this State an election for President and for Governor on the same day. The Presidential term being four years and the Governor's three years, vacancies in the two offices occurred together once in twelve years. The twelfth year after 1876 was 1898, when Harrison carried the State against Cleveland and Hill was chosen Governor over Miller. Without alteration in either term of office there would not have been an election for President and Governor on the same day until 1900. By the new Constitution, however, which was ratified when Mr. Morton was chosen Governor, the Governor's term was again made two years, and a President and Governor of New York will again be elected together next November.
