Just now the people of the entire country are engaged in a warm discussion of the financial question. Men who have never bothered their heads are just beginning to read and study and talk upon it, and it is probable that within the next few months the people of the country will obtain more knowledge concerning our money system than they have ever had before, and it is well that the discussion has begun thus early in the campaign. There is time before election for peo ple to learn that there are many phases of the question to be consid ered, and that it is not safe to form an opinion simply by following out one thread of the subject.

THE AMENDED SCHOOL LAW

Extracts from the Statute and also from Circular Issued by the Superintend-ent of Public Instruction.

S 14. Whenever any school district adjoining a city or village or adjoining any union free school district, by a vote of a majority of the qualified voters of such district, shall empower the trustees thereof, the said trustees shall enter into a written contract with the board of education of such city, village, or un-ion free school district, whereby all the children of such district may be entitled to be taught in the public schools of such city, village or union free school district for a period of not less than one hundred and sixty days in any school year, upon filing a copy of such contract duly certified by the trustees of such school district and by the secretary of the board of education of such city, village or union free school district in the office of the State superintendent of public instruction. Such school dis-trict shall be deemed to have employed a 'competent teacher for such period and shall be entitled to receive one distributive district quota each year during which such contract shall be continued.

8 15. The board of education of an city, village or union free school district so contracting with any school district. shall report the number of persons of school age in such district, together with those resident in said city, village or union free school district, and shall report for the pupils attending such school from such adjoining districts to the superintendent of public instruc tion, the same as though they were res idents of such city, village or union free school district."

§19. Whenever any district shall have contracted with the school authorities of any city, village or other school dis-trict for the education of the pupils residing in such common school districts the inhabitants thereof entitled to vote are authorized to provide, by tax or otherwise, for the conveyance of the pu pils residing therein to the schools of such city, village or district with which such contract shall have been made, and the trustees thereof may contract for such conveyance when so authorized in accordance with such rules and regulations as they may establish."

The first amendment empowers local school district authorities to submit to the qualified voters of their districts, at any annual or special district meeting, the proposition to contract with the au thorities of any adjoining city, village or union free school, for the education in such adjoining school of the pupils residing therein

If the proposition receives the affirm ative vote of a majority of the qualified voters present, such authorities may contract with such adjoining school fo school facilities for all their pupils, subject to the following conditions:

First. Such contract can only be made with the authorities of an adjoining city, village or union free school dis

Second. Such contract must be in writing, signed by the authorities of each district, or some officer thereof autherized by resolution to sign for them.

Third. Such contract must provide hat all pupils in such district between the ages of five and twenty one years shall be entitled to be taught in the public schools in all departments equally with the children residing in city, village or union free school dis trict.

Fourth. Such contract must provide for at least a period of one hundred and sixty days in each school year, or for such period of time as will in addition to that during which school shall have aid period.

Fifth. A copy of such contract must duly certified by the trustees of the Fifth. district so contracting and by the secretary of the board of education of such city, village or union school district and be filed at once in the office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction

at Albany.
Sixth. Having so contracted in pursuance of the provisions of the above statute, such district will be entitled to, with thoughts of this complex subject and will receive the distributive district qoota each year during the continuance of such contract. Such district quota constitutes part of the school funds of said district, and is subject to the order of the school authorities applicable to general school purposes.

Seventh. The board of education of such city, village or union free school district so contracting with an adjoining district will in their report include the pupils attending their schools under the provisions of said contract together with those residing therein the same as though they were actual residents of said city, village or union school dis-trict, and shall report for said pupils from such adjoining district the same is though they were residents thereof.

Eighth. The voters of said common

school district at any school meeting may appropriate said district quota or any other funds, except library moneys to the purpose of providing for the transportation of the pupils between five and twenty-one years of age residing therein to any schools with which the authorities of such district may contract and the authorities of said district should establish rules and regulations governing such transportation.

I desire to call the particular atten

tion of local school authorities to the foregoing provisions.

The people of the rural districts must at once face the situation presented by the large number of weak rural schools of our State. Wherever practical these districts should be dissolved and the territory annexed to adjoining districts A recent amendment to the school law greatly facilitates this course. But wherever this cannot be done owing to local objections, in all cases covered by the foregoing amendments I earnestly my life.
