it is but a few days since he was a prominent feature in the Democratic National Convention at Chicago, where he appeared to be in the very vigor of manhood, and made an earnest and able protest against silver monometalism and the debasement of the national currency. He said:

"For myself, no party on earth can induce me to do a dishonest act. I shall not attempt to suggest, much less to dictate, what course we shall pursue. I merely indicate what my own course will be. It will be an unswerving hostility to any action that this Democratic Convention may take while it is held in duress by the Populists, who, unfortunately, have captured it."

As Governor of Massachusetts, to which position he was elected in 1890 and re-elected in 1891 and 1892, although in the latter year Harrison carried the State by over 25,000, his administration was a marked success, and was all the more remarkable when it is considered that he was the youngest man ever holding the office. Had Mr. Russell been spared, he would have been a conspicuous figure in the fight which is now upon the party.
