The words of Mark Antony at the bier of Caesar: "He was my friend, faithful and just to me," fully express the relations existing between us. Of his labors and triumphs in the field of local journalism I spoke, while he was still here, in my contribution to "Allegany and Its People." During my association with printers and publishers, extending through many years, I met no worthier, cleaner-minded man than he. I have never yet written romance for history, never given undue or exaggerated laudation to the worth or genius of any person simply because that person had passed out of the land of the living; and because I knew Mr. Norris intimately, believed in him thoroughly, and venerate his memory profoundly, I pen this just tribute to his virtues, ending with the prayer that He who has said through His prophet: "I will be a father unto you," and through His son: "I will not leave you comfortless," may deal very graciously with those bereaved by his removal.
