After September 1st, in the State of New York every boy and girl who is between 14 and 16 years of age and employed in a wholesale or retail store, will be required to have a certificate from the department of health under the new laws passed during the last session of the legislature affecting the employment of minors in mercantile and manufacturing establishments. The health commissioner is now busy at work getting in readiness to put the law into effect.

The correspondent in Rome of the United Press telegraphs that, although the report that Monsignor Diomede Falconio would succeed Monsignor Satolli as papal delegate to the United States had been hitherto entirely credited at the Vatican, the Pope has appointed as Monsignor Satolli's successor, Rev. Sebastien Martinelli, Prior General of the Augustin Chaussee, and a brother of the dead Cardinal Martinelli. The fact that the nomination had been made has been kept secret, even from the most intimate associates of His Holiness, and upon its becoming known occasioned a general feeling of surprise. The Pope's choice is regarded as an excellent one. Rev. Sebastien Martinelli is about sixty years of age. He is a learned theologian, and is thoroughly versed in the foreign policy of the Vatican.
