THE SAME THING OVER AND-OVER.

Winners of Prize Drill at Cuba, Thursday, August 6th.

Fifty dollars—how to make it? Why, just march around and take it, as our fellow Citizens at Cuba did. Oh, there wasn't any minute that the Citizens weren't in it; 'Tis quite safe to bet on them your bottom skid!

Four thousand people are said to have been witnesses of the parade at the third annual convention of the Allegany County Firemen's Convention at Cuba last Thursday.

By the courtesy of the management, the Citizens' Hose of our town had the position of honor, the right of the line, in the procession. Of course, we are proud of our crack organization everywhere and always; and, equally of course, we rejoice that upon this occasion they added new boys to their crown by their fine appearance and by their masterly execution of novel, attractive and intricate evolutions in drill.

The weather was oppressively warm and the parading firemen suffered intensely from the heat during the parade and drill. Sixteen companies and nine bands were in the procession. The line of march was some over two miles in length, but after making that march the Andover boys were able to do some good running.

In the free-for-all prize drill but two companies contested, our very own Citizens' Hose and the Worcester Hose, of Silver Springs. The Silver Springs company did some really fine plain drilling; indeed, there is much to be said for their performance, and our boys felt "That strange delight which foomen feel in foemen worthy of their steel."

but our boys went to Cuba "a purpose," and brought away—as everybody here expected they would—first money for proficiency in drill. Foreman Bundy is especially proud of the achievements of his company. Under the burden of applause and the threatening thunder storm which broke forth, it was quite difficult for the drilling men to hear the Foreman's orders, and he considers much credit due them for their meritorious performances under such circumstances.

The Elmira *Telegram* has this to say: "The prize drill was a very brilliant affair, which took place on Main street before the many thousand people and sight seers. The Silver Springs company were first in the list and gave some very clever drills, but it could be evidently seen that they did not take with the crowd, however, but they had some very fine movements and secured 78 per cent. out of a possible 100. When the Citizens' Hose company of Andover appeared, the cheering was loud and long. A heavy thunder storm broke in on the drilling, which caused the Andover boys some alarm, as they were obliged to go through their movements at double quick time, and the noise and cheering was so profuse that it was impossible for them to understand all of the orders given, but notwithstanding these detriments, they secured 87 points out of a possible 100. Their leader, William Bundy, is one of the most proficient drill-masters that is in the business."

The judges in the prize drill contest were W. H. Simpson, Lieut. G. M. Mayer and J. C. Cook, all of Olean.

The *Wellsville Reporter* says: "The Citizens' Hose of Andover, W. B. Bundy, drill-master, honored themselves and their county by a remarkably beautiful exhibition. In the contest they followed the Worcester Hose of Silver Springs. This company put up a very pretty drill, but were outclassed by the Andover boys. Wm. Nye was the drill-master of this company of sixteen men. The Worcester gave a well-nigh perfect plain drill, and it was in the fancy difficult movements that Andover excelled them. The splendid work of the Citizens needs to be seen to be appreciated, and is worth going a distance to see.

The Citizens' Hose of Andover didn't show any badges until after the prize drill, then they flashed a bit of ribbon with the appropriate words: 'The Same Thing Over And-over! Winners of Prize Drill—Cuba, Aug. 6.' Nothing like having a sure thing. The Andover boys are all right."

The *Buffalo Express* calls our company "one of the finest drilled organizations in the State."

Upon the return of the victorious Citizens—upon whom the honors laid more thickly than did the dust of Free Cuba—they were met at the depot by a large delegation of their admiring townspeople and welcomed home with a salute from dynamite artillery. Oh, yes, we're proud of the Citizens' Hose, and we can't help it, you know, for at home or abroad they always "look out for No. 1."

Every member of the organization is held in praise of the unstinted hospitality and gentlemanly treatment accorded them by the fire department and citizens of Cuba.

The Republican County Convention.

MET AT BELMONT AUG. 7, 1896.

Grant Duke, of Wellsville, Nominated for Member of Assembly—State Delegates Chosen—Other Business Transacted.

The Republican County Convention convened at Belmont last Friday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. The Convention was called to order by Clarence Ricker, chairman of the county committee, when Hon. M. M. Congdon, of Clarksville, was chosen Chairman, J. P. Herrick, of Bolivar, Secretary, and Charles Benjamin of Rushford, and Frank B. Lyon of Cuba, tellers.

Delegates to the State Convention, to be held at Saratoga, Aug. 25th, were unanimously chosen as follows: W. J. Glenn of Cuba, Captain Geo. H. Blackman of Wellsville, Hon. Charles H. Brown of Belmont, J. J. Merrill of Alfred, Clarence A. Ricker of Fillmore, W. J. Garwood of Canaseraga, and W. F. Benjamin of Rushford.

The delegates to the Eighth Judicial District Convention chosen, were Hon. S. M. Norton of Friendship, and Geo. A. Green of Belmont.

Charles Ricker, of Hume, was unanimously nominated for County Treasurer.

The Convention then proceeded to a formal ballot for Member of Assembly. One hundred votes were cast, Grant Duke of Wellsville receiving 55, and Fred A. Robbins of Angelica 45, and Mr. Duke was declared nominated.

The county committee was named, and the Convention adjourned, and immediately convened in two sub conventions for the purpose of nominating two school commissioners. Frank Bluestone of Canaseraga was nominated for the Northern district, and Oscar M. Burdick of Little Genesee for the Southern district.

The Convention then adjourned, and the delegates repaired to the hotel Belmont, where congratulations to the newly-made candidates were in order.
