A GOOD ILLUSTRATION.

The Steuben Courier says: "W. P. Sedgwick has placed in his store window the most practical illustration of the silver question which has yet been devised. On one side are ten silver dollars, good the world over for their face value, by reason of the credit of our Government. Underneath these he has a block of silver which is the melted product of ten silver dollars, and which in that form is worth just \$5.25. On the other side is a ten dollar gold piece, and underneath a piece of gold obtained by melting ten gold dollars. Both pieces of gold have the same value whether they bear the Government stamps or are a shapeless lump. On the eilver melting, however, Mr. Sedgwick will have to lose \$4.75, as he can never get that block of silver which is worth only \$5.25 back into the shape where it was worth \$10."
