Complaint has been made that dynamiting fish in the creek has been carried on to a greater or less extent near this village. Perhaps the perpetrators are ignorant of the law in that respect, but if caught in the act ignorance would be no excuse. For the benefit of such we append the following section to the Laws of 1896:

§ 102. The use of dynamite or other explosives in any of the waters of the State is prohibited except for mining and mechanical purposes. The possession by any person on the shores or islands of the inland waters of the State of dynamite or other explosives where the use of the same is prohibited by this section shall be deemed a violation thereof. Whoever shall violate or attempt to violate the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be imprisoned for a period of not less than thirty days, and in addition thereto shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each violation thereof.
