What does the poor man get when he goes to the saloon? Does he get bread and meat, boots, shoes or clothing for his family? Does he get value received? Nay, nay; he gets a full stomach, a swelled head and bleared eyes; these he takes home to his family for a week's supply.

The development of suburban London moves on apace. A sign of the times is the recent opening of large estates where there are miles of roads lined on either side with dwellings, villas, etc., where legal provision is made and security given that at no time shall liquor selling be permitted. So anxious are people to have homes on these desirable conditions that the houses are frequently sold before they are built.

We trust that not many women who speak against woman suffrage before political committees, possess such a limited knowledge of the white ribbon organization as to state, as did their representative before the Democratic resolutions committee, that the W. C. T. U. does not want the ballot. Doubtless her auditors were better informed. If, not, they, with the speaker, were considerably enlightened a little later when the W. C. T. U. memorial was presented.

For foreign missions Methodist women have collected one million one hundred and fifty-three thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven dollars; for home missions, seven hundred and eighty-six thousand two hundred and sixty-five. They have fifty one Deaconesses' Homes, fifteen of which are in foreign lands. These deaconesses work without salary, and have held eleven thousand meetings and have cared for six thousand sick people. Yet the Methodist church hesitates to admit its devoted women to even a layman's privileges!

Alcoholic liquors form a large item in the hospital expenses of London. But the National Temperance Hospital has for many years been setting a helpful example among the other hospitals, even as ours in Chicago is doing, and the result in London is reported in a leading paper, which says that some remarkable evidence in favor of Sir Benjamin Ward Richardson's principle has been published in 1895. The superintendent of the Stone Asylum a year ago abolished beer and substituted lemonade and milk, and this has proved beneficial to all concerned; but the statement of Mr. Shaw, of Banstead Asylum, is even more striking. He says: "It is worth noticing that the high rate of recovery in this asylum has been coincident with the abolition of beer as an article of ordinary diet. It is very certain that the patients have taken their food better since the beer was stopped; but the great lesson taught by the withdrawal of this mild intoxicant has been that the people who have gone away are able to do without it!"

Oil at Jasper.

Drilling at the well of the Canisteo and Jasper Oil and Gas Company has been stopped, at the depth of 1,801 feet, for the purpose of shooting the well. The third, or oil-producing, sand was struck at a depth of about 800 feet, the vein being 55 feet in thickness, and the center of the vein at 820 feet. The drillers, who are judges of oil-producing strata, estimate that this well will be a five or six barrel well.

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:
